NATURE AND HIGH ART

Combine to Allure and Charm at the Commencement Exercises at the Pines.

A Magnificent Program Faultlessly Rendered—Winners of Special Awards Receive Their Honors.

A room, very beautifully decorated with evergreens, ferns and palms, filled with the sweet perfume of the flowers which hung in clusters around the walls, and resounding with sweet strains of music which fell like velvet on the ear of the listener—this was the enchanting scene which greeted the eye of the visitor who called at the Assembly Hall of The Pines yesterday afternoon and attended the commencement exercises of the school.

The concert was a great success, both in point of attendance and artistic merit. Each scholar conducted herself admirably and reflected much credit upon the able staff of teachers at "The Pines."

The two graduates of the day were Miss Mary Gertrude Sullivan, of Troy, New York, and Miss Frances O'Gorman, of this city. Miss Sullivan has been a student at "The Pines" for the last five years, and after this, her graduating year, her presence and happy manner will be greatly missed by both teachers and scholars alike. Last year, Miss Sullivan was the gold medalist. This year she has taken with honors the scholarship from the Toronto Conservatory of Music, for both the theoretical and technical instrumental music course, and the literary course. Miss Frances O'Gorman graduated in the literary course.

The program yesterday afternoon was varied and pleasing. Special mention should be made of Miss Sullivan's instrumental achievements. She is quite devoid of the garish mannerisms which are so great a fault with a large number of players, and her interpretations have a scholarly grace and beauty that are positively enchanting. Miss Edmondson, the other instrumental soloist, is also deserving of the greatest praise. Her solos were exceedingly well rendered, and showed to wonderful advantage, her rare power and instrumental facility.

Another special feature in the program was the semi-chorus given by six young ladies. A cantata, "Mizpah," and an operetta, "Queen Flora's Day Dream," were also given in the program. These wonderful exhibitions of musical and elocutionary achievement are always looked forward to with delight by everyone who attends the commencement at "The Pines." The audience yesterday was not the least disappointed. The parts were well and naturally rendered and earned on every occasion.

Bishop McEvoy, of London, occupied the chair of honor during the concert. Around him were seated, Rev. Fathers James, of Chatham; Boubat, Ridgeville; O'Donohue, Fletcher; Brady, Walkerville; Langlois, Tilbury; Courtois, Pain Court; Loiselle, Big Point; Aylward and McKee, of London.

At the close of the program, the Bishop spoke very briefly to the departing graduates. He hoped that they would long live to do good and help to make others happier and better.
