INDIANS SETTLED WITH.

Indian Treaty No. 9 Signed By the Province of Ontario.

Toronto, Nov. 17.—Hon. Frank Cochrane yesterday signed Indian Treaty No. 9 on behalf of the province, who acted in conjunction with the Dominion in effecting a settlement with the Indians north of the height of land, and east of the territory covered by Indian Treaty No. 3. The Dominion Government has been very anxious that an understanding with the Indians should be reached on account of the G. T. P. being projected through that part of the country. In order to appease the claims of the red men \$8 per head will be paid during the first year, and \$4 per head during succeeding years. Also a square mile of land for each family of five has been set apart as a reserve.

Treaty No. 3, which the new treaty borders, covers the stretch north of the height of land, north of Lake Superior, up to Rat Portage, and for some distance eastward.

The commission, composed of one member from the Ontario Government, and two for Dominion, explored the region and report fewer Indians than expected. Only 1,666 could be dealt with instead of the estimate of 3,000. The territory covered by the treaty comprises 90,000 square miles. The reserves are subject to the approval of the Ontario Government.

"It is quite probable they will be found satisfactory," remarked Hon. Col. Matheson yesterday.

The Province of Ontario will pay its share over to the Dominion, and the latter will bear all the expense of surveys, and the expenses of paying the Indians, which will be large.

Frank Pedley, Deputy Minister of Indian Affairs, discussed several questions concerning Treaty No. 3 with the Government.
