Editorial Notes.

We understand that a number of our citizens intend leaving for the Klondike in the spring. The chief problem that is worrying them now is how they shall invest their money.

It is the opinion of leading orchardists of the county that the apple crop of the Valley as a whole will not be more than a quarter of last year's crop. The fruit is also of an inferior quality. There is a large crop of pears, and about half a crop of plums.

Mr. Boers before commencing his entertainment last Tuesday evening stated that in all his peregrinations throughout the United States and Canada the "Academy in and around 'Evangelical Valley'" was the loveliest he had ever beheld. That's what they will all say—if they tell the truth.

The Toronto Mail and Empire is having considerable fun at the expense of Premier Hardy of Ontario and Hon. J. Israel Tarte. In a clever cartoon published in a recent issue, it rather satirically styles them the "Heavenly Twins." Notes from Halifax.

EXHIBITION NEWS—THE U. S. BATTLE SHIP, ETC.

DEAR ACADIAN.—A few notes from the capital may be interesting just now. The all absorbing point of interest the past week has been the U. S. warship *Indiana*. Military, naval and civil circles have been moved with curiosity to see and examine the big ship. The electric car service has been heavily taxed to convey visitors up town to the dry dock. The interior of the ship was not accessible to visitors until Sunday when great throngs of sightseers crowded her decks, cabins and turret.

Embryo generals and admirals aired their opinions as to her fighting qualities, and the busy ones allowed that the *Indiana* could sink her and not 'alf' her ship. Her construction is different from any warship yet in this port, inasmuch as her guns are all on deck enclosed in turrets which can be revolved to fire in any direction. In looking at her one gets the idea that an enemy's shells could play havoc with her deck equipments.

The nationality of her sailors appears to be varied, but they seem to be an average body of men, although not accustomed to that strict and systematic discipline so noticeable on our own warships. A very cordial feeling has been manifested towards our U. S. consuls while in port and nothing has occurred to mar it.

Exhibition matters are also well to the front. The buildings are gradually approaching completion. The race track is having a chequered history, and there are those who say that if it is intended principally to exhibit the speed of our back and truck horses of mongrel antecedents it will be no loss to the sightseers if the track remains unfinished. The racing of overworked cart and back horses should certainly be discouraged. If we must have a speed track as an accessory to our Exhibition, let it be for genuine racing horses, and not any old plug that an individual fancy there is a possible chance of capturing a \$5,000 prize with.

The propriety of granting space for a liquor exhibit has been under consideration by the Commission. One member thought it would have a bad effect on our youth. I think not; if the genuine product of the liquor traffic, the up to date drunkard, is also included in the exhibit; and no exhibit can be said to be complete without the furnished product.

The electric trains have now a quick north and service which will be much appreciated by Exhibition visitors. The I. C. Railway will run a siding in the grounds so that exhibits can be unloaded likely to be large. Live stock exhibit is also being arranged.

Machinery operated by steam power will also be very much in evidence. A long list of novel attractions are also promised in the line of amusements. The several contractors are pushing the construction work along rapidly.

We have to chronicle two drowning accidents as happening yesterday in our harbor, the result of careless boating.

The Dry dock has been kept very busy this season. The big iron four masted ship *Knight Bachelor* which ran against an iceberg last April, sailed a few days ago for Baltimore with \$40,000 worth of repairs on her.

Evangelical Beach.
A swimming tournament is to take place at the Beach in the near future. Further particulars later on.
