Death of Wilmot R. Green

We have this week to chronicle
a sad and most unexpected hap-
pening in the death by pneumonia
on Sunday last of Wilmot Robert
Green of Summerfield at the
early age of thirty five. Alert and
active he was busy with his
duties. A little over a week of
illness and he is gone, leaving a
young wife with a child of three
years and an infant baby. The
announcement of his death made
a profound impression every-
where and called forth wide-

spread manifestations of sym-
pathy and regret. The deceased
was one of Summerfield's most
industrious and promising young
men, and with his little family
seemed to have every human as-
surance of a happy and prosper-
ous married life. At the funeral
on Tuesday there was gathered
from a wide section of country a
larger concourse of people than
the church could accommodate.
The religious services were con-
ducted by the Rev. G. A. Rose,
pastor of the church assisted by
the Rev. W. J. Hurlow of Tracy's
Mills. A quartet from Florence-
ville led in the musical exercises.
The funeral management was in
charge of Edgar Green. Six young
men acted as pallbearers, George,
Judson, Louis, Wilbur, Morley
and Frank Lunn. Interment was
made in the Summerfield ceme-
tery.

Wilmot Green was the eldest
son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Green
and his death is the first break in
their large family. Seven other
sons survive and all but one live
in Summerfield. They are James,
Weldon, Harvey, Lee, Enoch and
Stanley. One son, Fred F., lives
in Calgary, Alta. There are also
three daughters, Mrs. Gideon
Green, Mrs. Clifford Jukes and
Miss Eva, residing here. The
young widow was Miss Kate
Malcolm of Easton, Maine. To
her and to all the members of her
husband's family the sincere
sympathy of the community goes
out in their present bereavement.

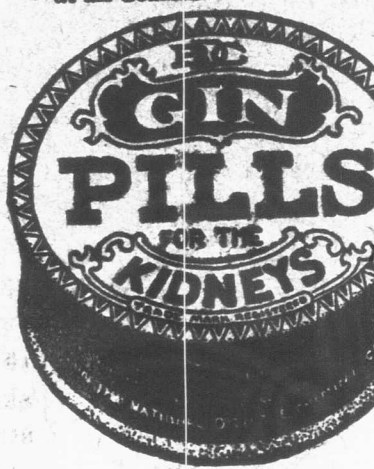
