PRESBYTERIAN CREED REVISION.

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States has concluded the revision of its creed, the work in which it has been engaged for some time past. The creed which has been revised was constructed by a council of divines held at Westminster several centuries ago, and it contained some things which have for some time past been rejected by most of the members of the Presbyterian Church. One of these is that unbaptized infants are doomed to damnation. The reader will find an interesting exposition of this doctrine in Burns's Holy Willie's Prayer. This has been stricken out of the Confession of Faith, and a statement that the performance of good works by an unregenerate man is sinful has been so far modified as to be virtually cancelled. There are other changes of a minor character, but not so many as the advanced thinkers of the Church would have desired to see. In such a work as creed revision the steps of the reformer have to be to a large extent regulated by the pace of the most conservative members of the church. The General Assembly, in its work of creed revision, was practically unanimous, only two members voting against the changes. These individuals were as they spoke, because unbaptized infants were no longer to be damned; but they were laughed at by the great body of the Assembly.

Perhaps the Presbyterian Church in Canada will now take up the same work of creed revision. It is absurd to keep doctrines in a Confession of Faith which no reasonable and enlightened man believes, and which therefore prove a source of offence to the best minds in the church. The divines who met at Westminster were no more competent to frame a creed from the Scriptures than are the scholars of the present day, and therefore there is no reason why this work should not be revised.

The London Athenaeum, which is owned and controlled by Sir Charles Dike, pays a handsome tribute to Dr. Davidson of the University of New Brunswick, who is so well and favorably known throughout Canada for his literary work. In a notice of the Annual Review of Historical Publications relating to Canada, edited by Prof. Wrong, the Athenaeum says:

The University Library of Toronto publishes in the series, University of Toronto Studies, a most interesting Annual Review of Historical Publications relating to Canada, the present number being for the year 1901, and edited, as before, by Prof. George W. R. Cross and Mr. H. H. Langton. There does not happen to be this year so much literary matter in the volume as there was last year, but there is no better publication and no series in the world more admirably kept up. In an article on the Newfoundland question Prof. John Davidson, of the University of New Brunswick, whose admirable volume on preferential trade and similar matters we have several times mentioned to our readers, proposes that the modus vivendi should lapse, and that we should announce that we will respect the treaty rights and no more, or, in other words, will withdraw from the King's Declarations on the ground that the French have never kept the strict letter of the treaty and of the French King's Declarations. We agree with him that it is futile to talk about compensation "when no one is agreed to the extent and value of the right for which compensation is" to be granted; and we believe that the course recommended by Mr. Davidson would be accepted by France, though with some grumbling, and is probably safer than a wide negotiation.

The Moncton Transcript celebrated its 20th birthday yesterday, and we congratulate our esteemed contemporary on its prosperity. We trust now that it is in its 21st year, and has attained years of discretion, the Transcript will begin to display a little more amiability in its treatment of its newspaper contemporaries and of public men. Heretofore the Transcript on most occasions has seemed to think with Jonathan that it is well to be angry, but this idea should now be abandoned. While congratulating the Transcript on its growth and progress we cannot allow its statements with regard to its circulation and size to go unchallenged. It claims to be "the largest and most widely circulated newspaper published in this province outside of St. John." Anyone who looks at the two

papers can see for himself that THE GLEANER is a larger paper than THE Transcript, and that it is a much better looking paper than our Moncton contemporary. We claim also that THE GLEANER has a much larger circulation than THE Transcript. In fact the circulation of THE GLEANER is only exceeded by that of one paper published in this province. THE GLEANER is a modern newspaper, and naturally it is an influential journal.

NO JURISDICTION.

Judge Landry Orders Release of Prisoner from Penitentiary.

MONCTON, May 26.—Judge Landry today ordered the release of Martin Steeves from the maritime penitentiary. Steeves was sentenced by a St. John's Magistrate to 15 to three years' imprisonment some weeks ago for forgery on the complaint of a Moncton merchant. The ground of the order for release was that the magistrate had no jurisdiction to sentence the man to penitentiary. This is the second case of this nature arising here lately. The other was that of Buck Benner.

DENVER, Col., May 27.—Ben Brown, aged 18, an aeronaut, made an ascent and parachute drop at Manhattan Beach, a suburb and summer resort, last night, and after falling in the middle of the lake was drowned before a boat could reach him.
