

SAD FATALITY.

Mr. John W. Hachey of Bathurst Fatally Shot.

WAS SHOT WHILE SHOOTING.

When gun was Accidentally Discharged the Contents Entered his Side.

Bathurst, Sept. 14.—A very sad and sudden accident occurred at Bathurst on Tuesday morning, the 13th inst., at about ten o'clock, John W. Hachey, about 20 years of age, the youngest son of Mr. John J. Hachey, merchant of Bathurst Village, after having partaken of his breakfast in his father's house, took down his gun to shoot some snipe which he had noticed near what is known as the Cove Bridge, on the western side of Bathurst Harbour, and in a half an hour afterwards was carried back to the house a corpse.

Young Mr. Hachey kept his light rowing boat, and had been in the habit of shooting the small wild fowl which congregated along the shore of the Cove. He had fired at something just below the bridge, and was evidently reloading his gun, and was standing on the span of the bridge, when he saw a bird drop from the sky and saw the muzzle of his gun pointing towards him. He immediately threw up his arms and the boat took to the water. He fell into the water and was seen to be struggling. The boat was blown to the shore and Mr. Hachey was seen to be dead.

Several young men had been gathered up in the neighbourhood of the accident. They were all well known to Mr. Hachey. He was a very lovable boy, and had a pleasant smile for old and young.
