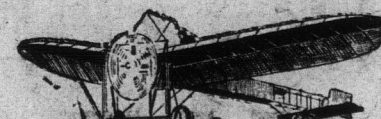

## Landing of Prince Albert.

H. M. S. Cumberland, Capt. Ambrey C. H. Smith, M.V.O., entered port this morning at 9 o'clock, having on board H. R. H. Prince Albert, son of their Majesty King George V. and Queen Mary. In honour of the pleasing visit of the young Prince every public building and all shipping in port were decorated with bunting. At 11 o'clock Capt. Beech, A. D. C. to His Excellency Governor Davidson, went on board the warship and arranged the hour for the landing of the Prince. At 1 o'clock His Royal Highness, accompanied by Capt. Smith, came ashore in the Cumberland's steam launch and alighted at the pier, well known as the King's Wharf, where, despite the adverse weather, hundreds of citizens and a squad of police, under Supt. Grimes, lined up.

The immense gathering were eager to catch a glimpse of the sailor Prince. All were favourably impressed at his delightful and pleasant appearance, as he is a fac-simile of his father who landed here as Prince George over thirty years ago. When Prince Albert came on shore heavy cheers were given for him while the disciplined land stood to attention and saluted. Then Prince Albert, accompanied by Capt. Smith, entered the coach of His Excellency the Governor and proceeded via Water Street, Queen Street, Theatre Hill, Queen's Road and Military Road to Government House to pay his respects. The customary in other British ports that the Prince has landed, to His Excellency the Governor who entertained the Royal visitor at lunch to-day. On Tuesday next an Afternoon Dance and Garden Party will be held at Government House in honour of the Prince. H. M. S. Cumberland will remain in port until Wednesday morning next, and no doubt the sojourn of Prince Albert will be made as enjoyable and pleasant as possible for him.

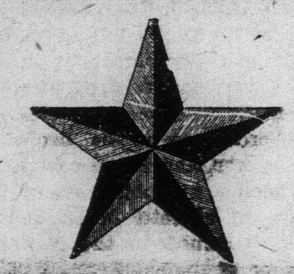

## His Royal Highness Prince Albert

Affable, Kindly and Jolly—Favorite with Cadets on 'Cumberland' Who are Typical English Lads, Robust and Healthy.

H.M.S. Cumberland arrived in port with Prince Albert on board at nine o'clock this morning. Capt. Smith, her commander, visited this side of the Atlantic last time in the cruiser Bellerophon, a ship which many in St. John's will remember, she having visited this port on several occasions, when her excellent band was heard to the delight of our citizens both at Government House on more than one occasion and at least once at the Regatta many years ago. The Cumberland was in North American waters as part of the command of Prince Louis of Battenburg, some seven years ago, but was then in charge of another commander. She is now doing a six months' cruise and has visited to date Teneriffe, Trinidad, Barbados, St. Lucia, Jamaica, Porto Rico, Bermuda and other islands of the West Indies. Quebec, Montreal, Halifax, St. George's, N.F., and St. John's, N.F. Prince Albert is purely and simply a Cadet on board ship and receives exactly the same treatment as the sixty-four Cadets who are his shipmates. Like the orthodox tar of the British Navy, he sleeps in a hammock, possesses his own sea chest, and has no greater privileges on board than his brother cadets. However, at each port of call on the ship's itinerary the Prince calls on the Governor of each Colony or Province, and pays his respects. The Prince on board ship merely continues his experience in the naval college. He is taking his four and a half years' training as a Naval Cadet, so that he might qualify for the next step as a sub-lieutenant. The routine of his day on the ship is as follows: 7.30 to 8 a.m., flag-signalling, etc.; 8 to 8.10, "stand easy"; 8.10 to 8.30, gymnastics; 8.30 to 8.55, breakfast; 8.55 to 9, prayers; 9 to 11, work; 11 to 11.10, "stand easy"; 11.10 to 12.30, work; 12.30 p.m. to 1.30 p.m., dinner; 1.30 to 2.30, work; 2.30 to 3.45, tea; 3.45 to 6, shore leave. (In port), 6 to 8.30, dress; 8.30 to 8.45, supper; 8.45 to 9, work; 9 to 9.30, "stand easy"; 9.30, prayers, turn in. The Prince in his work applies himself to practical engineering, with the usual instruction in seamanship and naval warfare. The naval engineering was introduced into the training of cadets some few years ago, and each cadet must put in an allotted part of his day in the ship's engine room and must, while in port, do his part in overhauling the machinery. When he has served his time on board ship and his training has concluded, he is supposed to be fully competent to undertake the duties connected with a modern warship. The Cumberland's work is identical to that performed by the cruiser Cornwall, in taking at intervals new contingents of cadets on board to finish their training. The Cumberland, laid down in 1903 in an armoured cruiser of 3,000 tons, 22,000 indicated horse power, and can steam 24 knots. Her largest guns are 6 inch; she is painted in the regulation gray and has three funnels. Other notable are on board as well as Prince Al-

bert, amongst the cadets. One is Mr. Tennyson, grand-son of the great Lord Alfred Tennyson, poet, and he is 18 years old, was born a couple of years after the death of his illustrious grand-parent, and is a son of Mr. Hallem Tennyson, Hon. Mr. Curzon is also a distinguished member of the cadet contingent though he is no relative of the celebrated Lord Curzon. To the visitor on the ship interest will centre mostly in the big vessel. Here the country's sailors and future commanders and admirals could be seen at their best. The lads act as good, strong, manly young fellows will, wit and repartee, joking and rolicking are in evidence, and there is ample proof to show that the life is anything but a dull one. Prince Albert can easily be known to the visitor to the ship by the striking likeness he bears to his grand-father, the late revered King Edward VII. He is very popular with the whole ship's company, but particularly so with the cadets who say that he is very friendly, lively and good humored, and is also obliging and considerate of others. Though his august parents gave strict instructions that no reception be given their son, he was lionized by the people of Quebec and Montreal, the streets and snatched by numerous cameras and as a result after leaving Quebec was in the sick bay for four days. At Gaspe the Prince had some nice sport fishing and captured a 20-lb. salmon. The Cumberland will remain here for four days when she will weigh anchor for Plymouth, on arrival at which place the cadets and officers will get a month's vacation. When the ship arrived in port to-day crowds witnessed her entering the harbor, the King's wharf and the piers along the waterfront were thronged with people of both sexes and all ages, and despite the downpour of rain, many cameras were levelled at the stately ship as her anchors brought her up in the deepest part of the harbor. Mr. James Vey, photographer, took splendid negatives of the landing of the Prince and the big warship, whose advent here at this particular time and with such a distinguished personage on board, is a noteworthy event.

## Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. TOLEDO, To-day. One man was killed, fifteen injured, many fatally, when the Pennsylvania train crashed head-on into the work train at Woodville, twelve miles east of Toledo.

SASKATOON, To-day. Katherine Simons, a twelve year old girl, has confessed to the murder of Julian Genick, aged nine. The prisoner in her confession states she quarrelled with the Genick girl and beat her with a shovel.

LONDON, To-day. The Serbian Parliament reached a decision on the question of the projected arbitration by Russia on the dispute between Serbia and Bulgaria. The debate was adjourned until Monday. The situation remains uncertain and critical.

NEW YORK, To-day. Gunboat Smith, California, defeated George Rodol, South African Boer, in the third round. After Rodol was knocked down twice, the referee stopped the bout.

LONDON, To-day. Liberals retained the Leicester seat but by a greatly reduced majority, the vote being: Hewart (Liberal), 10,863; Wilshe (Unionist), 9,279; Hartley (Socialist), 2,580.

LONDON, To-day. The fight for millions continued in the law court yesterday. The suit was brought by the family of the late Sir John Murray Scott to declare his will invalid, the will by which he left Lady Sackville five million dollars. Walter Scott, brother of the dead millionaire, who secured his title by inducing Sir Richard Wallace to give his priceless art collection to the British nation, was called to the witness stand and cross-examined by Sir Edward Carson. He testified the Scott family did not suggest there had been any undue relations between Sir John and Lady Sackville.

## Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, To-day.

Two hundred tons of fuel oil on board the steel tank steamer Mohawk, owned by the Standard Oil Company, exploded with a terrific roar yesterday afternoon while the vessel was anchored off Thompkinsville, Staten Island, New York Bay, killing five, injuring six. A dozen more are unaccounted for, but it is believed they have escaped on a craft that came to the Mohawk's aid, or by swimming ashore. Two bodies were seen floating in the hold while the fire boats were still pouring streams of water into the wrecked after-end of the steamer last night. The other 3 victims are probably blown to pieces. The carelessness of the machinist's helper is reported to have caused the explosion. Fifty men, including the crew and twenty machinists who were making repairs, preparatory to the Mohawk's departure for Tuxpan this morning were on board. The helper is declared to have dropped a washer into the hold below the fire room. Seeking to recover it he is believed to have carried a lighted candle which caused the combustion among the generated gases in the hold. The explosion was heard many miles around. A two hundred foot flash flame and column of smoke of volcano debris was seen. The Mohawk settled while the fire boats and the tugs of the Standard Oil wrecking tugs and other harbour boats came to the scene. The Mohawk's life boats were tossed hundreds of yards and blown overboard. Three men were rescued unhurt from the waters and others clung to rails and were huddled in the bow when they were dragged to safety by persons in the first boat which ventured near.
