Birds in War. HOW THEY SAVE LIVES. A sailor recently stated that seagulls are very useful for betraying the whereabouts of a submarine. When the birds discern a periscope they rise in a flock from the water's surface and circle round it, uttering any neighbouring ship, which gener-

ally results in the submarine being discovered. Whilst seagulls are unconsciously aiding sailors, parrots are carrying out equally useful work for soldiers. I! has been discovered that parrots have an extraordinary faculty for anticipating the approach of aircraft. Before an aeroplane has come within range of the human eye, the feathered alarum becomes violently agitated and shrieks incessantly. There are a number of parrots in cages on the top of the Eiffel Tower in Paris, whose duty consists in giving warn-

ing of the approach of hostile air-For many years caged canaries have been used in mines for the purpose of betraying dangerous escapes of gas from the coal fissures, and this practice has now been extended to submarines. This breed of bird occupies an important position in many under-water vessels, for canaries are quickly rendered unconscious by poisonous gases, which are likely to suffocate a submarine's

crew unless speedily detected. In France, where the wooded state of the country results in fights in forests being frequent, wild birds often provide artillery observers with clues as to the whereabouts of hidden batteries. Birds rise in flocks from trees in the vicinity of which guns are being fired, and when there is a lull in the activities of the concealed artillery many of them, probably with an eye to their nests, return to their former perches. A trained observer can quickly tell, from the erratic movements of flocks of birds over woods or foliage, the approximate locality of gun batteries

### hidden from his view. BRITISH CONSUL IN NEW YORK ISSUES STATEMENT.

Knows Nothing of Request From

England to Send Men Across. New York, April 15 .- Sir Courtnay W. Bennett, British Consul General here, in a statement last night, declared that the consulate had no knowledge of rquuests recently reported to have been made for workmen to be sent from this country to Great Britain to take the places in ndustrial establishments of those who are at the front. In connection with this report it was stated that 200 workmen already had sailed for England. Sir Courtnay says he has been deluged with inquiries but that he knows nothing of the proposed
