Men and Munitions.

A short time ago Major General Hughes, head of the Canadian Militia Department stated that 56,000 soldiers had been sent across the Atlantic from Canada for the firing-line. On Tuesday he announced that 35,000 more men are wanted to go from Canada to the firing line in France as quickly as they can be trained and equipped.

The new regiments are to be recruited as follows:—
Four Highland regiments, one from Vancouver, Victoria and Winnipeg, a second from Ontario and two from the Province of Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

Two regiments from Alberta, two from British Columbia, two from Saskatchewan, one from Manitoba, two from Winnipeg, two from the London division, four from the Toronto division, two from Eastern Ontario (the district between Kingston and Ottawa), four French-Canadian regiments from Montreal and the Province of Quebec, including the 57th and 60th battalions, for which recruiting commenced a short time ago; two regiments from the Maritime Provinces.

The six new batteries of artillery according to the announcement, will be organized as follows:—
One from Eastern Ontario and Quebec, one from the London district, two in the Toronto and Hamilton district, one from the Maritime Provinces and one from Western Canada.

Canada is also doing something to aid in the supply of munitions. But much more is required if a certain rumor is to be believed. We heard

that in one of the recent engagements in France, the Canadian artillery used, in one hour as many shells as the Canadian factories turn out in a week. This illustrates the difficulty which the British are experiencing at the front. The need for munitions exceeds even that of soldiers for the firing line. There is need for speeding up in other places than on the Clyde, the Tyne, the Mersey, and South Wales. We are told that the War Office is offering to take full output of factories for two and three years ahead. Is it not possible for something in this line to be done here by our engineering plants?

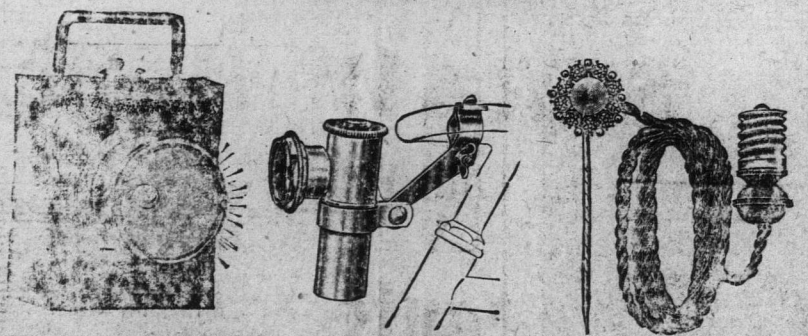

have organized the positions captured by us Thursday night. On Friday morning we captured another batch of 150 prisoners, among them a Major. In addition many German wounded have been admitted to our ambulance. The bodies of dead Germans can be counted by the hundreds. We have captured three more quick firers. We have bent the German line in length one and one-third miles, and in depth two-thirds of a mile.

GERMANS PLEASED.

AMSTERDAM, To-day.
The German press express satisfaction at the announcement that heretofore prisoners taken from German submarines by the British, will be accorded the same treatment as other prisoners of war.

ITALIANS ADVANCE.

UDINE, Italy, To-day.
Italian forces are advancing through Predil Pass on the junction of Lailbach railway and Travlis, which lies six miles on the Austrian side of the Italian border.

MUST BE NO STOPPAGE.

MANCHESTER, To-day.
A group of trade union officials returned here to-day from London where they were in conference with Government authorities. They made the statement that the Government had explained to them plainly that there must be no stoppage in the Lancashire cotton industry. Lancashire operatives are to-day demanding ten per cent increase in wages. Spinners are prepared to issue lockout notices at the end of this week which would tie up no less than forty million spindles.

REPORT UNTRUE.

ROME (Official), To-day.
The report contained in the Austrian official statement that a British warship of the Liverpool type had been sunk off San Giovanni di Ledua, is untrue. The British ship alluded to in the Austrian statement participated with our flotilla in successful operations against the coast of the Gulf of Drina on the 11th and returned with them to one of the naval bases at a speed of 17 knots.

THE LONDON BUDGET.

LONDON, To-day.
The American note to Germany, which is considered here as firm but pacific, divided the interest of the British public yesterday with the successful Russian counter-attack against the Austro-German lines in Galicia. When the placards of the receipt of the note, there was a general rush for copies, as the text had been anxiously awaited. It arrived too late, however, for comment in the evening editions. The Russian success naturally caused gratification and relief. Military experts expect there will be a repetition in Galicia of what occurred before Warsaw last winter, when the Germans suffered enormous losses in their efforts to break through the Russian front on the Bzura and Rawka Rivers. Russian reinforcements arrived in time to force back a portion of General Von Lipschitz's army, which crossed the Dniester River near Zarawna before they could be strengthened and their official Russian counter-attack of fighting in this region, but from the account issued in Petrograd, the Austro-Germans must have suffered very heavy losses and have lost 12 guns and 7,000 prisoners. In fact military men express the belief that very few of those that crossed the river could have escaped. The Russians also claim that further up the Dniester, directly South of Zvenigor, they have pressed their opponents back and have taken another 2,000 prisoners, while near Mosaic, East of Przemysl, they say the Germans suffered very severely when they attacked the Russian position. In Eastern Galicia and Bukovina, the Russians continue to fall back on the Dniester under Austrian pressure. Following the example of the Italians, who occupied Avlona, the Albanians port on the Straits of Otranto, the Serbians are marching across North-east Albania toward Port Durazzo while the Montenegrins are making for Port Alessio, still further North. For some time Albania has been overrun by bands which it is alleged were organized by Austrians and Turks to harass Serbia. In fact these bands have more than once invaded Serbia territory. The opinion generally expressed here is that these occupations probably will spell the end of Albanian integrity. Heavy fighting continues along the Italian frontier, particularly on the Isonzo River, where the Austrians are making a most determined effort to stem the Italian advance. Friday's toll, exacted by German submarines, was five vessels, the Russian steamer Strathcarron, the Russian steamer Dania, the Swedish steamer Otoko, the Russian Bark Thomasina and the British trawler Intrepid. A British warship was attacked by submarines in the Adriatic but reached port slightly damaged.

SECRET CONTRABAND.

NAPLES, To-day.
The German steamer Bayern, which had been interned in this port since last August, was to-day unloaded by the Italian authorities. On a search of the cargo being made, hidden under ostensible goods of no particular importance, were field guns, machine guns and several aeroplanes. As none of this material was mentioned in the ship's papers, the customs authorities seized all.

SAFE IN HARBOUR.

LONDON, To-day.
The British Press Bureau, commenting on the announcement of a British cruiser, said to-night, the ship presumably referred to was safe in harbor and not seriously damaged.

STILL SHORT OF SHELLS.

LONDON, To-day.
In his address at Cardiff, Lloyd George said it was his purpose to organize South Wales to speed up the output of munitions just as Lancashire had been organized. Referring to the dire need of ammunition, he said, I hardly like to say it but we are still short of shells. We must get them. There must be equality of sacrifice in contribution.

FRENCH GATHER IN GERMAN BOOTY.

PARIS (Official), To-day.
On Friday, we fortified the positions in front of Neuville St. Vaast. We continue the inventory of war material captured by us. We have found three far in the ruins three 77-millimetre field guns, three bomb throwers, 15 quick firers, which were buried in the ground or damaged. Thousands of grenades, one thousand rifles, eight hundred thousand cartridges, incendiary implements, number 105, millimetre shells in very large numbers, engineers' implements and tools, numerous cases containing explosives and other articles and equipment. NEW YORK, To-day.

PROGRESS ON GALLIOLI PENINSULA.

LONDON, To-day.
The Athens correspondent of the Daily Express wires regarding the operations in the Dardanelles. The Allies are now fighting in the region of the town of Gallipoli, having arrived within a four hours' march after terrific fighting on the extreme circle the enemy in entrenchments to the north of the town. A great battle has been in progress since Thursday around Maidos. The Allies occupied two hills near Maidos. OUTBREAK OF CHOLERA.

PARIS, To-day.
A despatch from Udine, Italy, says that cholera in Austria is much worse than the outbreak last year. A great panic, it is asserted, has been created in Vienna by the epidemic.

RUSSIANS REPULSE TEUTONS.

GENEVA, To-day.
A despatch to the Tribune from Innsbruck, says the Teuton garrison

of Przemysl attacked and marched on the Wisnina, but were repulsed by the Russians. A German General of the division and several officers were badly wounded by a shell which fell into their headquarters. The Teuton losses are estimated at 5,000.

RUSSIA REPORT SUCCESSFUL.

LONDON, To-day.
Morning Post sends the following dispatch: Additional success for Russian arms with the capture of many prisoners and guns, are chronicled in an official statement issued on the night of the tenth and the following day. The Germans, after a far-reaching bombardment, renewed the determined attacks from west of Shavli, on the front of Koujilice, Kahlav, and Elnoraitz. Several times during the night they reached our barbed wire entanglements but each time were thrown back, leaving piles of killed and wounded on the left bank of the Dubysa. From Shavli to Kahlav, on the morning of the tenth, the Russian important success taking by vigorous night attack over five hundred prisoners with guns, mitrailleuses and other booty. The enemy continued its fruitless attacks in the region of Mososika on the right bank of the Dniester. We continued to press the enemy between the Rivers Tysmenica and Swica, capturing many prisoners. In the morning of the tenth, the Russian column developed an energetic offensive and made prisoners of the entire Fifth Company of the 79th Austrian regiment. On the left bank of the Dniester on the front of Olochow and Bukasowicz fighting has been obstinate since the tenth, terminating in the complete defeat of the enemy who was thrown across the Dniester. The enemy here suffered especially severe losses among the section of the Prussian Guards in the village of Wyschniow where we captured 18 guns, eighteen mitrailleuses and many prisoners. Attacks by the enemy on the ninth on the bridge head near Halicz were repulsed. The development of our troops on the line of the Dniester above Halicz rendered necessary a corresponding modification of the front of the troops occupying the Pruth line. In the morning of the tenth our troops evacuated Stanislaw without fighting. Near Polongie we repulsed the German attacks further south. In the afternoon of the tenth we captured eleven hundred prisoners during a counter-attack on the ninth.

GERMAN NEWSPAPERS HARD HIT.

BERLIN, To-day.
A syndicate of German newspaper publishers addressed to the German Chancellor a request for immediate suppression of the duty on foreign paper. Publishers declare that this duty is so high that it is impossible to be able to continue publishing their papers, if the war continues for an extended period, as present prices are already prohibitive and the losses of revenue as a result of the conflict average fifty per cent.

TRAWLER SUNK.

LONDON, To-day.
The trawler Waago, was sunk by a German submarine in the North Sea. The crew was saved.

HEAVY BAIL FOR GERMAN WHO IS CHARGED WITH SEDITION.
Calgary, Alta., June 4.—Bail was fixed at \$2,000 and two sureties of \$1,000 each by Police Magistrate Sanders, for Reynold Jordan, a German, who is charged with having "spoken certain seditious words thereby inciting discontent, dissatisfaction and sedition among His Majesty's subjects."

Major Duncan Stuart, who defended Jordan, objected to the amount of the bail, but the magistrate refused to change it. Major Stuart declared that the report had been exaggerated, and that after a long talk with the defendant he had discovered that the system "spoken" were not seditious words. He said Jordan had been drinking, and that too many drinks had made him too talkative.
