### THE LONDON BUDGET.

LONDON, To-day. The American note to Germany which is considered here as firm but pacific, divided the interest of the ritish public yesterday with the sucessful Russian counter-thrust gainst the Austro-German lines in Galicia. When the placards of the evening newspapers announced the receipt of the note, there was a gen-eral rush for copies, as the text had een anxiously awaited. It arrived too late, however, for comment in the evening editions. The Russian success naturally caused gratification and relief. Military experts expect there will be a repetition in Galicia of what occurred before Warsaw last winter, when the Germans suffered enormous losses in their efforts to break through the Russian front on the Bzura and Rawka Rivers. Russian reinforcements arrived in time to force back a portion of General Von Lipsingens army, which crossed the Dneister River near Zurawna be-fore they could be strengthened and entrenched. The German and Aus-The German and Austrian official reports make mentical of fighting in this region, but from the account issued in Petrograd, the Austro-Germans must have suffered very heavy losses and have lost 17 guns and 7,000 prisoners. 
