The German Government is about issue a memorandum to neutral overnments announcing that here-fter armed merchantmen belonging o countries at war with Germany will be considered and treated as war-ships. The Government contends that this measure is justified by ex-plicit instructions by the British Ad-miralty to the merchantmen, which are said to be the object of the German authorities. These instructions it is understood here, were that merchantmen should carry guns to attack submarines on sight. The German are submarines on sight.


