Go to Barron, of Hoylestown, has received TRAPNELL, the eyesight specialist, from Giessen, Germany, the accompanying letter from her husband, Private Peter Barron, of the First Nfld. Regiment, who was taken prisoner by he Germans last summer in France, a few days before the "big drive." The etter reads:

"Dearest Wife,-Just a few lines oping to find you and the children quite well as I am. I was glad to reeive a letter from you on the 19th of October, but I have not received a parcel yet from home. Dear wife, have written three or four letters and : hope you have received them by this ime. I am glad to tell you I am getting parcels from London through the Canadian Contingent, so you need not vorry as I am getting on all right. Do ot send any money, as I do not need it. This is all I have to say this time Hen-1st. and 2nd., G. R. Williams; With fondest love to you and children. good-bye, I will write again soon


