It had been the owner's custom to have a keeper on the place during the winter months, but this winter the custom had not been followed. It is presumed that the goods were lifted by some late coast trader who put in there, and looted the items mentioned. The matter has been reported to the authorities, and it is hoped that they will lay their hands on the culprits.
