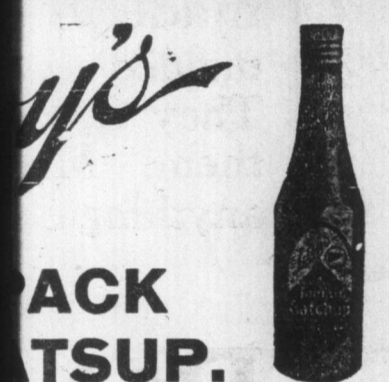

The Oppositionists.

The position is this. The present opposition consists of Mr. R. A. Squires and Mr. W. F. Coaker, and his few lesser satellites.

Mr. R. A. Squires was Minister of Justice and Colonial Secretary during the Morris regime from 1913 to 1919. He held his position not by virtue of the voice of the electors (for he was signally defeated by the Coakerites in Trinity District in 1913) but by being a member of the Legislative Council or Upper House simply through party machinations. His tenure of such a position in such a manner, was contrary to the spirit of the Constitution (though it may not have been contrary to the letter) and no man fulminated louder against it than Mr. Coaker, who is now hand-in-glove with the same man.

Added to this are the claims regarding payments received by Mr. Squires from Reid, over which liberal suits are now pending; though the News and Herald claim that they can substantiate the statements and are prepared to prove them in substance and fact.

Then there is Mr. Coaker, who so readily seized upon the opportunity to join the Morrisites when the Coalition Government was formed. Who apologized right and left for the men whom he had up till then been attacking; who in 1918 allowed the Reids to increase their passenger and freight rates, and—so the "News" says and it hasn't been libelled yet—asked Reids to back a note for \$20000.

These people are the men who ask the people to support them to fight Reids.

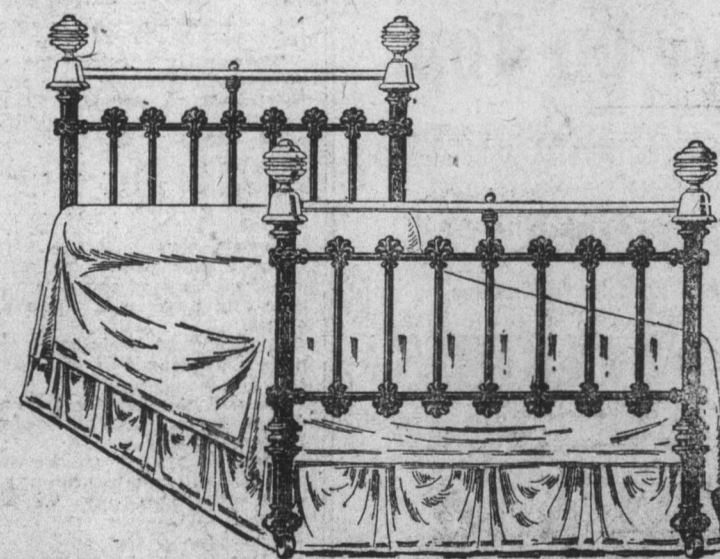

Nfld. Scotch Cured Herring.

There is little to report in the Newfoundland Scotch cured herring market. Arrivals are still few and the quality of these has not improved.

Newfoundland herring exporters are naturally interested in the news which

comes from Great Britain to the effect that Germany has forbidden the importation of herring into Hamburg, and at a time when it was believed, the people were clamoring for this fish. The British Foreign Office have no information as to the attitude likely to be adopted by the German authorities as regards the import of herrings into Germany, beyond the information contained in a telegram received a few days ago from the British consul at Rotterdam, which was to the effect that all herrings consigned for sale in Germany must, in future, be sold to the Reichsfischverwertung; that no license would be issued for firms or individuals to trade in herrings, but that herrings consigned to Hamburg

will not, in future, be detained. Apparently the purpose is not absolute prohibition of fish imports, but rather regulation under government control.—N.Y. Fishing Gazette, Sept. 20.
