



Prince Pays Visit

TO ARCHBISHOP BRUCHESI JUST BEFORE LEAVING MONTREAL.

MONTREAL, Nov. 3.—One of the last acts of the Prince of Wales before he departed from the city yesterday, was an impromptu visit to His Grace Archbishop Bruchesi, at the Hotel Dieu Hospital, where, for the past two weeks, the Archbishop has been confined for treatment. The visit was an agreeable surprise to His Grace.

"You know, Prince," remarked the Archbishop, before the Prince left, "what name the people have given you?" and as the Prince seemed not to know, His Grace continued:

"Others will tell you what it is, but I wish to call you by another name — 'Conquering Prince.' You have passed through our country as a conqueror and your conquests are the finest that can be. You have conquered all hearts, and most especially that of the Archbishop of Montreal."

Before leaving the Hotel Dieu, His Royal Highness signed the register next to the name of Cardinal Mercier and other eminent visitors, among whom are many Royal names.

A letter friend who has read my talk on the house-work girl who does not want to work in a home where there are several children, wants to know what I think of the landlord who does not want to rent his house or apartment to a family with several children.

What she thinks is perfectly plain. She is the mother of five. It is not at all difficult to answer her question.

It's Hard on the Man With a Family. I think it is terribly hard on people who are having enough of a struggle to bring up a family of children, in these days of dollars that won't buy a half a dollar's worth, to have to be discriminated against because they are doing their duty by the race.

Also I think it is terribly hard on landlords who are having enough of a struggle to get any return from their property, in these days when a dollar's worth of repairs costs at least two dollars and when taxes are having an ascension race with the high cost of living, to have their rent automatically reduced by renting to a family with several undisciplined children who will double the repair cost.

All Children Are Not Undisciplined.

But— Doubtless someone is going to suggest that all children are not undisciplined. They are not, but many are, especially as regards matters which do not come back upon the convenience or pocket books of their own people.

It is inevitable that even the best of children should rush around more than grownups and thus take more out of a house. And when children are not the best,—well, you know the rest.
