HENRY BLAIR**Forty-Three Years in the Public
Service--The Evening Telegram****Alexander Bay Deputation
Meets Government.****Citizens Committee Ask Executive to Assist
Company--A Splendid Avenue for Employment.**

A Citizens Committee from Alexander Bay yesterday met the Executive Government and asked it financial assistance could be given the Terra Nova Sulphite Company to enable them to complete construction work. Two million dollars have already been expended and all the requisite material and machinery has been bought and paid for. The sum of half a million dollars is necessary to spend on labour in completing the plant and putting it in a condition to start operations. The Government, while expressing their desire to help, informed the deputation that to lend the company half a million was, considering the present financial situation of the colony, utterly impossible. It was with regret that they had to make this decision, they said, as they fully realized the benefit which would accrue to the colony through the operations of the Terra Nova Sulphite Company.

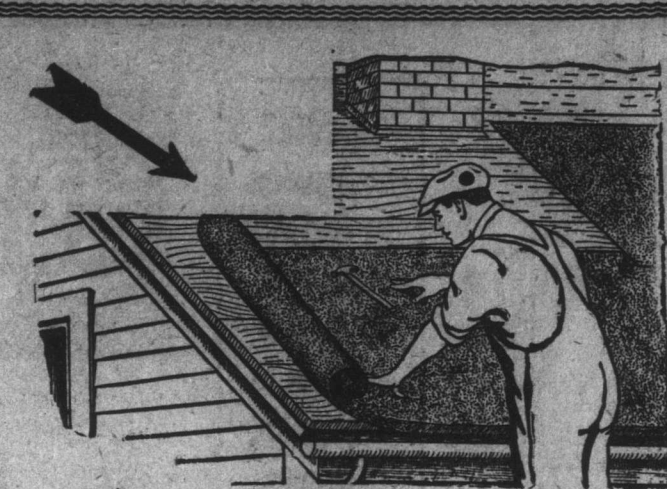
A CITIZENS COMMITTEE.
The deputation consisted of the following representative citizens of Alexander Bay, Rev. E. H. Humphries, Church of England, rector of Salvage; Rev. E. R. Anthony, Methodist Minister of Glovertown; Messrs. H. J. House, and F. B. Arnold, Business men of the district, and Mr. P. Grouchy, treasurer of the company. When it was learned that construction on the plant would stop, the feeling of the people was so strong that a public meeting was called and was attended by over 220 electors of the district. At this meeting a Committee of forty was appointed to discuss the matter and they selected the deputation to wait upon the Government. On Thursday, accompanied by the members for Bonaville they had an interview with the Prime Minister who arranged the meeting with the Executive.**A LARGE PLANT.**
Up to a few weeks ago when the manager, Mr. Blacksted, flew to Alexander Bay with Major Cotton, few had even heard of the Terra Nova Sulphite Company. Yet a two million dollar plant has been erected within a few miles from the city. Mr. Grouchy, an official of the company, told the Telegram that the object of the promoters is to manufacture dried baled sulphite pulp. The technical name for this is "mitscherlich." It is used for the better grades of newsprint and other high grades of paper. This pulp is in great demand at all times, and now, when the value of paper and pulp is at its lowest, fetches \$70 a ton and tends to increase in value. The output of the plant is estimated at 16,000 tons annually.**ADVANTAGES TO COUNTRY.**
If the company could find the necessary capital to enable operations to be begun, employment would be given on a large scale. Three hundred men could be permanently employed at the mill, and work for six hundred men would be found in logging operations for a great part of the year. This would not, however, interfere with those who wish to prosecute the fishery. The minimum pay roll of the company would be \$300,000 annually. The Government would benefit by indirect taxation to the extent of \$120,000 annually, and by direct taxation on the company to the extent of \$40,000. Thus, each year, the revenue of the colony would be augmented by \$160,000. Asked by the Telegram why the Norwegian capitalists who subscribed the original capital of \$2,000,000 did not put up the further sum of \$500,000 rather than take the risk of losing all already paid up, Mr. Grouchy said that exchange was considerably against Norway and the sacrifices required to make up the further amount would be enormous. Unless this capital can be found, construction will have to cease, said Mr. Grouchy.**SPLENDID LOCATION.**

Several pictures of the plant were shown the Telegram. The main building is a large one and this with the outhouses and wood yards, occupies ten acres of land. The plant could not be located in a more satisfactory situation from every point of view. In the first place, there is as much water power as will ever be required there, and this can be developed very cheaply. The plant is at a tide water and steamers can come within a half mile of it, thus rendering the building of a railway unnecessary. Added to these helps to cheap production is the fact that there is an abundance of labour in the district around, and there will therefore be no necessity to build a town. The timber limits of the company are large enough to provide sufficient wood for 90 years without allowing for natural growth during that period. These limits have been surveyed by Norwegian experts and by civil engineers on the staff of the Montreal Engineering Company and they have estimated the amount of wood to be nearly 2,500,000 cords. The process by which the pulp will be produced is named after its inventor, Mr. Jonsson, and is most economical while giving better results than those methods at present in use. It is unfortunate that the remainder of the necessary capital cannot now be raised when labour is cheap and values have reached their lowest ebb and are tending to advance. Mr. Grouchy and the other members of the deputation return home by Sunday's express.
