This report, of course, contains tabulated statistics for the full year, and is therefore somewhat behind the current monthly returns, which are always ready for press at the end of each period, so that those who like to keep abreast of the figures can always refer to the per mensem statements and make up their totals from these. For the report under review we beg to thank the Registrar General, who epitomises the annual return from the various deputy registrars in the preamble of his official statement. 
