CAPT CHATE AT GRAND BANK.
The Story of the Kyle-Fisheries Scandal for Paradise Pur.

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After being marooned three weeks on the Kyle and unable to get in town with Harris, Captain Chate arrived here at five o'clock on Saturday afternoon. He held a meeting at eight o'clock which was attended by practically all the men left in the place. He told an interesting story of the manipulation of the Kyle by the Government for political purposes. The Kyle passed Fortune and Grand Bank when she might have called, carrying passengers, mails and eleven hundred packages of freight with the apparent purpose of landing Warren at Br. Breton. These goods included hooks, provisions and fishery supplies. For lack of which the bankers are lying here paralyzed, unable to prosecute the fishery for the present. The Shipping Department states the Kyle's freight will be transferred to the Portia, but we are reliably informed that the most of the goods is still on the Kyle and will be landed at Lousburg or some other far away port.
