# UNION MOVEMENT IS MAKING A DISTINCT HEADWAY IN CANADA

Rev. J. A. Clark Tells of Recent  
Assembly of the Presbyterian  
Church at Toronto, and the  
Congress Which Preceded  
the Regular Gathering

GREATEST PRESBYTERIAN  
GATHERING EVER HELD

Matter of Union Will Be Referred to People In About a Year and General Support Is Expected; Opponents Are Numerous, But Vigorous

The Union movement has made clear move forward at the Presbyterial Assembly at Toronto, according to Rev. J. A. Clark, of Knox Church, who returned yesterday from the east. In fact, Mr. Clark says the final consummation will come much sooner than is expected by the great majority of the people in Canada. Still the church has to move wisely and considerately and is anxious above all things to avoid a disruption

The matter is now left in the hands of the committee while his is to be held November 1. His matter will again be submitted to the General Assembly next year and there will be a vote taken. It is expected that there will be still more unanimous feeling in the church at that time. The matter will then be referred again to the Fresh Air committee. The vote will be taken a little over a year from now and it is thought that then will come the final stage of the great bulk if not the unanimity.

According to Mr. Clark the congregation which was held immediately before the assembly was one of the most remarkable religious gatherings ever held on the continent. It was also the largest attended Presbyterian gathering ever held in the whole world. There was fine spirit, vigor and high level of speaking was maintained. The hall which housed the auditors was crowded to the roof three times a day and

remarkable fact about the whole proceedings was that the speakers were men of the Canadian Presbyterian church with the exception of a couple. The resolutions were all the proof to the world of the judgment of the church on all matters of current interest and the position is adopted to the advantage of the cause. There is no danger too much talk about the fine effect of the meeting, but there was no doubt that the congress had affected a great benefit on the work of the church, large and in the coming year a result will be seen through the work of the

Mr. Clark said that in discussing union question with men in Toronto on the way to the west, it was generally agreed that the union movement had made a great stride forward at the time. True opponents of the movement were not numerous but vigorous and was felt that they were not beyond conversion. The great bulk of members of the assembly felt that

of the church members was in sympathy with the movement for union. Yet the leaders were anxious to avoid disruption. Still the union would come sooner than was expected. The matter was left open for the present. The committee would meet again in November and would make a recommendation to the assembly.

It was felt that so well acquainted with the facts of the cases would the people become in the interval that they would give a practical unanimous judgment on the matter. The method
