It has been experienced many times in the past that the department could not get away in reasonable time on account of having to wait for horses. The truck will overcome this and will be ready for instant use. The chassis for the truck was purchased from J. L. Thayer, Ford dealer and the body and the fixtures will be made by the Bickle Co., of Woodstock. The new truck will carry a 40-gallon chemical tank as well as two hand tanks with 250 feet of chemical hose, as well as a quantity of water hose now carried on the hose wagon. Two ladders, axes, lanterns and six men will also be accommodated. The total cost will be \$2060, and the new truck will soon pay for itself at the present rate of keeping two horses for fire purposes.
