Toronto, Sept. 13.—11 p.m.—A very

small depression which was in Missouri

last night has moved north to the lake

region, causing showery weather, but the

general distribution of pressure over the

continent has changed but little. The

weather has been cold and rainy in the

Northwest Territories and fine and warm

in Manitoba and from the lakes east.

Valuable Cattle Slaughtered.

STRATFORD, Sept. 13.—A couple of weeks

ago it was announced that tuberculosis was

prevalent in the city, and that a well-

known breeder of thoroughbred cattle had

suffered the loss of 57 head. Within the

last few days another ten head of choice

cattle were added to the list, making a

total of 67 head belonging to the fine herd

of John Idington, Q.C., that have been

slaughtered and buried without so much

as removing a single hide, the total loss

being estimated at something like \$7,000.

—Mr. Peter Cochran, section man of the

L. and P. S. division of the L. E. and D.

R. R., died Wednesday evening at his resi-

dence, north of the G. T. R. station, St.

Thomas, in his 63rd year. He had been

in this country from Dumfriesshire, Scot-

land, seventeen years ago. His wife died

three years ago. He was a member of the

Presbyterian Church.

—Mr. Fred. T. Trebilcock, manager of the

Canada Smelting and Refining Com-

pany, of this city, left for New York yester-

day, accompanied by his sister, Miss

Eulie, and brother, Master Percy, who will

visit their brothers and sisters in New

York. Mr. Trebilcock will visit Prov-

idence, Boston, Philadelphia and the largest

cities in the United States in the interest

of the smelting business, and will not re-

turn from his trip for about a month or six

weeks.

—The new free library building will

cost \$12,000 and have a frontage of 100

feet on Queen's avenue and 60 on Well-
ington street. It will be of red brick. The

first floor will be for library purposes and

the second for a museum, while the base-
ment will be used for furnaces and storage.

The reading room will be 38 by 28 feet.

The design of the building is Gothic, and

will present a handsome appearance. It is

expected the free library will be a reality

early next year.

—A well-attended and enthusiastic young

people's meeting under the joint auspices

of the Epworth Leagues of Christian En-

deavor of the Methodist churches at Bel-

mont and Derwent was held in the former

edifice last night. "Perils and Possibil-

ities" was the subject of the address of the

evening, delivered by the Rev. R. N. Burns,

B.A., of Toronto, president of the Metho-

dist Young People's Association of Ontario.

The chair was occupied by the pastor, Rev.

T. Jackson, who spoke with good effect,

and short addresses were also given by

Messrs. W. R. Manning and W. Thompson.

A cordial vote of thanks to the Rev. Mr.

Burns was moved by Rev. Mr. Currie, pastor of

the Presbyterian Church, seconded by the

Rev. Mr. Racey, of the Church of England,

each of these gentlemen making short and

effective speeches. Excellent music was

rendered by a union league choir, under

the efficient leadership of Mr. Boyd.

—No. 2 committee met last night, with

Ald. Thomas Jones (chairman), Taylor,

Dreaney, Shear, C. G. Garratt, Engineer

Graydon, Secretary Bell and Commissioner

Owens present. Engineer Graydon re-

ported that Victoria and York street

bridges required painting this year. The

Kensington, Blackfriars and Oxford street

bridges could remain till next spring.

Tenders will be called for both painting

and jacking. The secretary of the

Seventh Band asked permission to hold

a joint concert with the Hussars' Band.

Instructors of both bands were

willing and it would be a novel affair.

The balance in the concert fund is \$147 75,

and some of the aldermen thought it was

a scheme to eat this sum up before the cold

weather set in. The suggestion will not

be carried out, and the concerts will go on

as usual. The engineer stated in reference

to the proposed drain on College street, be-

tween St. James and Oxford, that there

was no drain on Oxford at this point, thus

preventing an outlet. It would be neces-

sary to get the ratpayers on Oxford

westward to Wellington to sign a petition

before the drain could be constructed. Re-

ferred to the assessment commissioners.

The appropriation of the committee has

been reduced to \$5,800 53.

Rev. G. W. Wye's Case.
