UNSETTLED WEATHER.

TORONTO, Oct. 9.—11 p.m.—The depres-
sion from the Pacific has spread over the
whole Northwest, causing strong winds and
somewhat higher temperatures there and
light rain in Manitoba. Fair weather pre-
vails in the lake and eastern districts, with
the exception of Eastern Nova Scotia,
where it is raining. An important storm
is moving quickly up the Atlantic coast,
and is now central near Cape Hatteras.Minimum and maximum temperatures:
Calgary, 24°—52°; Battleford, 24°—44°;
Qu'Appelle, 24°—42°; Prince Albert, 30°—
56°; Winnipeg, 34°—48°; Port Arthur, 28°—
48°; Toronto, 42°—50°; Kingston, 42°—
52°; Montreal, 42°—50°; Quebec, 42°—52°;
Halifax, 48°—58°.

escape into the river. He stated that the
overflow had occurred from the neglect of
the foreman in allowing the tank to over-
flow. The nuisance would be abated at
once, he said. In view of this Mr. Parke
suspended sentence. Mr. McCann, fish-
eries inspector, was the complainant.

\$50 or Three Months.

Wellington Barnes, a Pottersburg hotel-
keeper, pleaded guilty yesterday before
Squires Lacey and J. B. Smyth to selling
liquor to Indians. He was fined \$50 and
costs. Barnes was given a week to pay,
and in default will serve three months in
the county jail. Mrs. Rachael Summers,
of Muncie, Ind., claimed that her son and
Thomas Nichols, another Indian, bought
liquor at Barnes' on Sept. 20, and got so
drunk that Summers was arrested.

A Good Story.

Among the stories told last evening by
Rev. S. Card in his lecture on "Juvenile
Criminality," in the Dundas Street Metho-
dist Church, the following particularly
good one: "We had a colored boy, who,
by the way, was from London—also, who,
very clever, a great talker, and especially
good at repartee. On the day of his de-
parture from the institution one of the
guards said to him: 'Sambo, the best thing
you can do is to study and become a
moment and then replied: 'No, sah; I ain't
going to be a preacher. When I go home I
am going to work and earn an honest
living.'"

Mantell at the Grand.

Dumas' thrilling melodrama, "The Cor-
sican Brothers," was presented at the
Grand last night by Robert Mantell, who,
as usual, was greeted by a large audience.The play was given here two years ago,
with more attention to stage detail. The
ghost scenes in the first production were
admirably worked out with every weird
accessory, but last night much of the
supernatural effect was lost by the
absence of these devices. However,
the performance was excellent, and
Mr. Mantell in the dual role made a pro-
found impression. His handsome presence,
splendid vocal powers and undoubted
ability eminently fit him for
heroic parts. He was favored with two
certain calls and responded with good
humor. He was ably supported by the
clever actresses, Charlotte Behrens. The
company was large and competent.

Remodeling the Road.

The St. Thomas Journal has the follow-
ing in regard to the street railway of that
city, in which several London men are
interested: Mr. J. A. McLean attended a
meeting of the directors of the St. Thomas
Street Railway, held at Detroit last Fri-
day, when the resignations of John Win-
ter and George W. Hendrie as directors
were accepted. The meeting adjourned
till yesterday afternoon, when it was held
in the office of McLean, McLean & Cam-
eron. The resignations of Cameron Cur-
rie, president, and Strachan Hendrie,
treasurer, were accepted. Messrs. C. B.
Hunt and E. R. Cameron, of London, were
elected directors. Mr. J. A. McLean is
the only other member of the board. Two
directors are yet to be elected. Mr. Cam-
eron was elected president of the board.
Mr. John Break, of Toronto, secre-
tary-treasurer and local manager at St.
Thomas. He will commence his duties
immediately. Today a force of men were
put to work to thoroughly repair the road-
bed and track. More horses have been
purchased, and in the meantime it is the
intention to give as good a service as is
given by any horse car street railway. At
an early date a proposition will be made to
the city council looking towards the elec-
trifying of the road, and extending lines to
different parts of the city. The men be-
hind the undertaking are stated to be men
