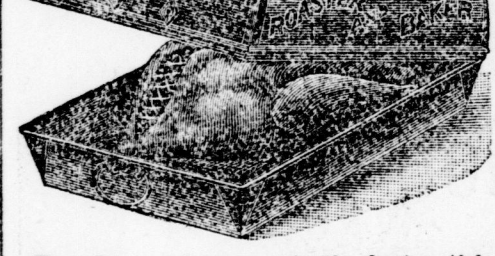

277 Alexander avenue, by Rev. Joseph
Hogg—(Winnipeg Tribune).—Mrs. G. F. Morris, York street, who
has been in the General Hospital for some
time, and underwent a successful surgical
operation, has returned to her residence.—Mrs. Morris speaks words of praise for the
nurses and officials for the kind treatment
received from them.—The trustees of the Protestant Orphans'
Home desire to return their very sincere
thanks to the Sons of England for their
generous donation of \$10. It is gratifying
to the ladies who have this good work in
charge to be so kindly and substantially
remembered from time to time.—Mr. Joseph Austin, employed in the
M. C. R. coal dock, St. Thomas, died on
Saturday, aged 65. He was born in
Cheshire, and for years resided in London
and Hamilton before going to St. Thomas.
He for years kept the Robinson Hall Hotel
in Hamilton. He leaves a wife and two
sons and two daughters.—Having terminated a most successful
season, Miss Jessie Alexander sailed for a
three months' sojourn in Europe. One of
the chief objects of Mr. Alexander's visit
is the study of climate to be fostered
through Scotland, England and Ireland,
and no doubt she will return in the fall
