They rode on the sidewalk, marched through the streets in groups, and made combinations which on ordinary occasions would cause their appearance before the bar of justice on a charge of disorderly conduct; and during the greater part of Wednesday night they gave persons in the vicinity of the leading hotels but very little chance to sleep. But the police did nothing to put a stop to the fun of the merry crowd.

Due to a misunderstanding among the wheelmen, the parade turned out to be somewhat of a failure, including few besides the bands. This, however, did not keep people from the races, and for nearly two hours men, women and children looked to the grounds in one continuous stream. Two new covered grand stands had been erected at the roadside, and these with the old one, were taxed to their utmost capacity. Hundreds had to be satisfied with a seat inside the ring fence, while hundreds had to be contented to remain standing.
