HOW TO LIVE LONG.

Marriage is the Prescription of a Distinguished Berlin Physician.

Some curious figures have lately been made public by a celebrated Berlin physician which seem to point to the fact that if a man wants to live long and preserve his health and strength he ought to marry. Among unmarried men between the ages of 30 and 45 the death rate is 27 per cent. Among married men between the same ages it is only 18 per cent. For 41 bachelors who live to be 40 years of age, 73 married men triumphantly arrive at the same period. The difference goes all the more marked as time goes on. At 60 years of age there are only 22 bachelors to 43 married men; at 70 there are 11 bachelors to 27 who were married, and by the time they reach 90 the married men are 3 to 1, for there are 9 of them to every 3 bachelors! And yet, in the face of facts like these, we still find men daring to remain single! It really is as much as their lives are worth, if they only come to think of it. Men may talk of their lives being shortened by domestic worries and anxieties and cares. That is all rubbish. Statistics must tell the truth, and these statistics of the Berlin doctor say that the man who is a bachelor stands in far greater risk of a shortened span.

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PRESIDENT CLEVELAND'S MESSAGE.

President Cleveland sent his Message—probably his final one—to Congress at noon today.

The Message is a most important one. It deals with vital questions.

The President says further provision for the protection of seal life in the Alaskan waters is necessary, and urges that the sum agreed upon, by the arbitrators as damages to British vessels shall be paid by Congress.

He suggests that an international commission should be appointed to further delimit the boundary line between the Canadian Northwest and Alaska.

He points out the unsatisfactory state of affairs regarding international jurisdiction of the entrances to the Great Lakes, and he proposes international joint action to properly define the spheres of Canadians and of citizens of the United States.

In strong, yet dignified, language, the President reaffirms the Monroe doctrine, that no European power shall be permitted to extend its jurisdiction on this continent, and he reports to Congress that his Government has taken the ground that the right to the whole territory in dispute between British Guiana and Venezuela shall be submitted to arbitration. Britain's reply to this view has not yet been received in Washington.

The President expresses strong sympathy with the Cubans in their struggle for freer institutions, but takes the ground that international obligations must be maintained by the United States.

The greater part of the Message is devoted to a discussion of the financial situation of the United States. President Cleveland reaffirms his opposition to class tariff laws, and asserts that recent reforms are in the right direction, they are, he says, opposed to "enervating paternalism." But he insists financial reforms must follow. He proposes that greenbacks shall be retired, and that national banks shall be allowed to issue the necessary currency to take their place, after buying bonds and depositing them with the Government as security.

They are anxiously awaiting the completion of their own power house.

There will be a male quartet and also a male chorus led by Mr. Stuart Huntington. The Musical Society Band will play a couple of choice selections. Negotiations are in progress towards securing a first class humorist. The public can rest assured that the entertainment will be first class in every particular. The names of the outside talent will be announced in a few days.

Toronto, Dec. 3.—A proclamation has been issued, submitting the Scott Act to the electors of Westmoreland, N. B., on Jan. 6 next. More than one-fourth of all the electors of the county recently petitioned that they be given an opportunity to pass again upon the measure. Westmoreland has stood by the Scott Act, since 1879.

The officer refused to allow them to enter the country, and sent them back to Canada.
