LONDON WINS FROM SAGINAW.

The Saginaw ball tossers have been considerably strengthened since their last appearance here, and gave the home team a decidedly lively argument at the season's first game yesterday afternoon. It was one of the fastest games of the season, with the exception of a couple of yellow streaks. Cooper and Robb were the opposing pitchers, and both did good work. The locals had no difficulty in finding Robb, and landed on him for four singles and two triples in the first three innings, but only secured one tally on the head of 4c. In the third, Hart rapped a nice one to right field for three bases, and Jones followed with a hit to the same place, good for the same number of bases. The visitors scored their first run without an effort, Hemphill dropping two flies that dropped right into his mitt. Saginaw accused their second and last tally in the easy manner. Cooper hit, Guise, Ichler sacrificed, and Eddy did the same, advancing Guise to third. Robb was given a pass, and on his going down to second, Pickard made a bad throw to Mohler, and Guise crossed the plate. In the fourth it looked as if Cooper would have to quit the game. He stopped a hot liner batted out by Eddy, with his pitching arm, and it was some time before Cooper could proceed. Robb was ordered to warm up, but was not needed. Cooper pluckily finished out the game. In the sixth inning London pulled away from the visitors, scoring three runs. Robb started it by forcing a man in on a balk, and the man on first walked to second. Some wrangling followed, Robb claiming that he was out of the box and that it was no balk. The umpire consulted the rules and maintained his decision. In the ninth inning Mohler made a couple of errors, failing to gather in two ground balls sent in his direction. He worked in a neat double play shortly after.
