New York, Jan. 21. - Close. - The bank statement is a complete surprise in the enormous expansion of loans shown. There was nothing to indicate that this development would occur, but low rates for money on call have probably resulted in the transfer of many loans from trust companies to banks. The effect on the market has not been great, but has caused some liquidation. The somewhat sharp declines which took place during the last half-hour were thought to be due not so much to the bank statement, as to umors that were current that the situation in Russia had become very serious, and that there was a possibility of an open revolution. Of course, should this occur, it would have a most disturbing effect upon European mar-kets. In spite of the weakness sentiment in conservative quarters remains optimistic, investment demand is brisk.
