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PROMOTER CANTIN
NOT THE ONLY ONE
Solomon Dale Also Charged With Passing Worthless Checks—Case Adjourned.

LEAVES LONDON FOR ST. KITTS
Mr. John Paul Severs His Connection With the Michigan Central Railway

London, Jan. 21.—To lose one of her well-known railroad men by the removal of Mr. John Paul, who for sixteen years past has been agent of the Michigan Central Railroad Company, Mr. Paul has been appointed general freight agent of the Niagara, St. Catharines and Toronto Railway, and of the Niagara St. Catharines and Toronto Navigation Company.

Mr. Paul will assume his new duties on or about Feb. 15, and his headquarters will be at St. Catharines, where he resided previous to coming to this city. His successor here has not been named. Mr. Paul entered the business about 25 years ago and was first employed by the Grand Trunk at St. Catharines, where he has many friends. He came here for the M. C. R. sixteen years ago, and during that time he has become popular with the business men of the city. He is known as a good manager and has many friends among all classes in the community. In Masonic circles especially is Mr. Paul prominent. He is past master of Kitching Lodge, and is present preceptor of Richard Coeur De Lion Preceptory.

Mr. Paul will be greatly missed in London, but nevertheless all will be wishing him the success they are confident he will accomplish in his new post.

A NOTABLE WEEK AT THE CATHEDRAL
The Seventieth Anniversary of St. Paul's—Seven Days of Celebration.

Beginning tomorrow and continuing until the evening of Sunday week (the 29th), inclusive, a continuous celebration of the seventieth anniversary of the cathedral church of the Diocese of Huron will be held. Every preparation has been made to make the celebration one of the most notable that has ever taken place in connection with any religious body in the city. Just as the number 70, multiple of the sacred number seven, has a great and good significance in Scriptural history, so the 70th anniversary of the cathedral is an important epoch, and stands for a great history. The old cathedral has been associated with the growth of this city in ways that no other church has been, and with the rise of Anglicanism in Western Ontario from its earliest stages until, like St. Paul's, it has attained a mature age.

The pioneers of the Church of England in this diocese, and the struggles which accompany the founding and building of a great institution, in a way have been handed down to the 70th anniversary of the cathedral embodied their memories, and further, it is the fact that the traditions of Anglicanism, handed down from the past centuries of the history of the motherland, have been assimilated to the conditions of our own country, and that the church in Ontario, which we now call "Old Ontario," is stretching forth her hands and her influence into the new lands of the north and the west.

Rev. Canon Dann has prepared a historical sketch of St. Paul's, which is being embodied in neat pamphlet form and will be sold, for a small price, during the week. It will prove a very interesting and valuable souvenir.

Tomorrow, the Lord Sunday after Epiphany, communion service will be held at 8:30 a.m. and the Bishop of Huron will preach at the morning service. In the evening, Rev. YEAR IN THE CENTRAL
Alex. Green Sentenced for Stealing Hides at Strathroy.

He was brought to the jail to-morrow morning, and is now in the county jail.

CAPT. THACKER'S REPORT
Is Compiling His Notes Upon the Russo-Japanese War.

Ottawa, Jan. 21.—Capt. H. C. Thacker, R. C. A., having reported his return from Japan, will be specially employed by the War Department to compile his notes and observations upon the Russo-Japanese war, and will not be available for regimental duty until that date.

Lieut. Brevet Captain H. Kemble-Realty, R. C., and Lieut. H. C. Hill, R. C., are appointed chief instructors, and will respectively of the School of Musketry, during such periods as the school is open for instruction.

Officers and non-commissioned officers of the Canadian Engineers at Ottawa and Montreal will be opened upon the 29th inst., and will be maintained for a period of six weeks. They will be under the supervision of the district officers commanding.

MONKEY BUSINESS IN VIEW
California Man Importing 500 Simians to Pick Prunes.

San Jose, Cal., Jan. 21.—The proposition to train monkeys to pick the fruit crop has been advanced by a California man, who is a resident of this city. He conceived the idea of training the animals to do such work while a resident of Central America.

Seely says that he has made arrangements with A. B. Janos, of Acapulco, Panama, to import 500 tamed monkeys, and that this shipment is now on its way to California. Obtaining help to pick the prunes off the trees, he says, is the most difficult part of the business, and that he will have no trouble in training the animals to pick up the fruit and will place muzzles on them to prevent them from eating the fruit.

Orchardists in general doubt the practicability of Seely's plan. It is not known whether the monkeys can be trained under the law forbidding the importation of contract labor.

UPRAIDED, SHE SUICIDES
Girl Beats Sister in Race to Cann and Leaps In.

Montreal, Que., Jan. 21.—Philonene Massy, a 16-year-old girl, who resided with her parents at Turcot village, a southwestern suburb of the city, was seized yesterday by drowning herself through a hole in the ice in the Lachine Canal, close to which the village is situated. The girl is stated to have been wayward and incorrigible, and yesterday while being upbraided by her parents, declared that she would destroy herself. She forthwith made off in the direction of the canal, pursued by her mother and sister, and succeeded in carrying out her intention.
