THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO TODAY

[From The London Advertiser of Jan. 30, 1871.]

The city bakers advanced the price of bread today. Flour has experienced a considerable rise in price during the past two weeks.

Late on Saturday night the sheds on the south side of the exhibition grounds were discovered on fire, and but for the timely discovery of the danger, and the promptness of Mr. Crawford in applying the proper remedy, a large loss of property would have resulted.

The Conservative journals, following their self-elected leader, the Telegraph, still keep harping on the string that Mr. Blake is a failure. Outsiders not specially interested in Canadian affairs, will have rather a poor opinion of our country when they find that such a complete failure as Mr. Blake has exercised such an influence in our Legislature. If a man who has only been in public life a few years, and while in Opposition at that, can leave the impression on his mind on almost every Government measure, but is yet a "failure," what name shall be given to the ministry of Sandfield Macdonald?

The long-expected news of the capitulation of Paris has at last arrived. The almost frantic efforts of the Republican leaders have been in vain, and the capital of France is in the hands of the German Emperor.

According to cablegrams, the terms are, for modern times, of unparalleled severity. It was generally supposed that Alsace, Lorraine and Metz would be demanded. But in addition to these provinces, Bismarck asks for a French colony, for 40 warships and for 100,000,000 francs, as some indemnity for the expenses of the war, as well as a measure of punishment for the conquered nation. Dreadfully humiliating is this for the valiant and proud people of France; yet it cannot be considered undeserved.

Anna Eva Fay was again greeted by a packed house at her performance at the Auditorium last night. Fully four hundred people were turned away, so great was the anxiety to hear Miss Fay. At a quarter to 8 seat-holders had to fight their way into the Auditorium.

QUEBEC, SUMMER PORT

Mr. Fitzpatrick Confirms Report of C. P. R. Terminus.

Quebec, Jan. 20.—Quebecers are enthusiastic over the improved shipping outlook of the port. In this belief they are strengthened by the utterances of the minister of justice, Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick, who is here today. He asserts that it is a positive fact that the C. P. R. have not only decided upon utilizing Quebec as a Canadian summer port of their Atlantic steamship line, but that they are to take over and complete the work of wharf extension. They will then fill in a large tract of wharfage beyond the new pier and run trains down alongside the ships. On the heels of this official statement comes the word of the minister, however, he positively confirmed, that the Atlantic are also to use this port for their fast new boats after Aug. 1, 1907.

A TALKATIVE GHOST

Puts Two Drivers Out of Business and Scars Horses.

Winsted, Conn., Jan. 20.—It only remains for "Chick" Merriman to give up the job as stage driver on the Litchfield-Torrington route, and the community will be convinced that the ghost of Toll-Gate Hill is a terror.

No question remains in the minds of those acquainted with the facts in the case that a formidable ghost has taken up his abode at the foot of Toll-Gate Hill, but it hangs in the balance whether the ghost will win out in the fight in which two stage-drivers have been put to rout already.

"Billy" Harris was the first confronted by the apparition on Thanksgiving Eve. He was dozing on the stage-coach seat, when the horses reared and bolted. Harris was about to seize the reins, when the blood froze in his veins. A ghastly figure danced lightly at the heads of the horses, which were running at breakneck speed. It placed two gaunt hands on the horses' heads and murmured: "There are no holes here." Then it was gone. Harris was in a state of collapse when he reached Litchfield, and threw up his arms.

Harris was unmercifully grieved by "Tim" Meagher, who gladly accepted the drivership.
