#### **CHINESE TROOPS** FOR PROTECTORS

Rev. F. A. Steven Does No. Feel Any Anxiety for the Safety of Missionaries.

#### CUSTOMS OVERRIDDEN

This Is the Reason Why the Chinese Are in Rebellion in Affected District.

The southwest of the province of Sz-Chuan is the territory of the American Baptists, and the Church Missionary Society is active in the northwest. In the centre of the province, where the city of Chengtu is situated all the extension work is left to the Canadian Methodist Church. A Sturdy Class.

A Sturdy Class.

"The people of Sz-Chuan are a pecularly, sturdy and independent class," said R.v. Mr. Steven to The Advertiser, "They have a heavy population, some 67,000,600, and they very eften strongly resent the interference of officials from other parts of the country. It is the policy of the Chinnese Government to move officials about, and a man is never appointed to a high office in his own province. Hence the people naturally resist the heavy taxation which is levied by these officials either at the command of the Emperor or for their own purposes. The building of the railroad from Hankow to Chengtu is perhaps the chief cause of the present rebellion. About 190 miles of rapids will be avoided above the city of Hankow, which rapids make it impossible for large steamers to proceed farther up the five."

Increased Taxes. "The building of the road will en-tail largely increased taxes, and, furthermore, it is an overriding of old customs. The Chinese also fear that furthermore, it is an overriding of old customs. The Chinese also fear that it will increase the cost of transportation, and that it will turn out of employment thousands of boatmen now employed on the river. Then, tee, a foreign loan has been negotiated for the railway, and naturally allows to the foreign countries involved a certain measure of control in the operation of the road. This is in direct opposition to the cry of "China for the Chinese."

"It is a long time," Mr. Steven stated, "since there has been a serious rising in Sz-Chuan. There was no trouble here at the time of the Boxer uprising. It is just probable that the missionaries who were under escort to the Yangtse, to take refuse in the city of Chungking, have been

"I spent the winter of 1883-84 in Chungking, and it is a very large and important city," said Mr. Steven.

Element of Unrest.

"There is always an element of unrest among the people. They are heavily taxed, and although in Sz-Chuan there is no famine, yet they are affected by reports of famine and flood in other provinces. The flooding of the Yangtse Valley will result in a famine which will last until next May. This is the second famine in one year.

"However, I think the missionaries in Sz-Chuan will be safe enough. Tuan Fang, who has been appointed commissioner for the building of the new railroad, is an extremely enlightened and able official, and he is very friendly to the foreigners. He was formerly a viceroy, and at the time of the Boxer troubles saved the lives of a great many missionaries."


