"WHITE SLAVE" INSPECTOR FRIEND OF THE CABARETS

Montreal, Feb. 8 .- J. Lambkin, special officer appointed by the Dominion Government to investigate "white slave"

ernment to investigate 'white slave' conditions in Montreal, admitted today that he is likely to lose his job as the result of criticism of his actions made by Recorder Weir and the Moral Reform Council of the Methodist body.

Mr. Lambkin was called as a witness recently before the license commission, which finally decided to cut off the licenses of the cabarets, or night cases, of Montreal. During those sessions the recorder, as a member of the commission, criticised in caustic terms the tame attitude of Mr. Lambkin, while the police, Protestant and Catholic clergymen, and even the Licensed Victuallers' Associaeven the Licensed Victuallers' Associa-tion, in an official resolution, united in denouncing the cabarets as immoral re-

It is charged against Lambkin that he was too friendly with proprietors of the night cafes. Both Recorder Weir and the Moral Reform Council have sent reports on Mr. Lambkin's conduct to the Minister of Justice at Ottawa. In his statement today, the "white slave" inspector says he could not honestly support in his evidence the charges against the night cafes.
