Paris, Nov. 7 .- Via London. - Last night was barren of important happenings along the French front, the war office announced today, there having been only intermittent cannonading on portions of the Somme front and on the right bank of the Meuse in the

German airmen dropped incendiary bombs on Nancy yesterday, but did no damage, according to the official statement. There were no casualties.

Today's statement recepitulates the prisoners taken by French-British troops in the course of the fighting on the Somme front since July 1, giving their number up to November 1 as 71,532 men and 1,449 officers, while the number of guns captured is given as 173 field guns, 130 heavy guns, 215 trench mortars and 981 machine guns.
