CANADA OUT TO HOLD VOTE IN NATIONS LEAGUE

Ottawa Sends Renewed Urgent Representations To Imperial Authorities.
LENROOT RESERVATIONS
Strong Objection To Proposal in United States Senate As To Vote.

OTTAWA, Feb. 13.—(Canadian Press)—Renewed, urgent representations were, it is understood, made to the imperial authorities today against agreement to any peace treaty reservations which will affect the status or voting power of Canada in the League of Nations. The proposed reservations have the United States government particularly in view and especially reservation fourteen, proposed by Senator Lenroot.

Lenroot Resolution.
The Lenroot resolution has been under discussion by the cabinet from time to time, and a number of communications, it is said, have previously been forwarded to the Imperial Government. It is understood, however, that one of the principal matters before last night's meeting of the cabinet was the situation which would be created should the Lenroot reservation be adopted and decision was reached to make further representations.

Direct Representation.
Canada's right to direct representation in the assembly of the League of Nations and to be counted as a full-fledged member of the league was secured only after a long fight at the Paris peace conference. In official circles there is the strongest objection voiced to any modification of the League of Nations covenant, which will in any way affect Canada's status or voting power.

Remain in League.
The suggestion has been made that should Canadian voting power be reduced the question would have to be considered whether Canada would or would not remain a member of the league at all. This, however, is a phase of the situation which has not been officially considered.

Discussed at Washington.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Press dispatches saying that Canada had asked Great Britain not to accept the treaty reservation reported by the Republican element in the United States Senate with regard to the voting power of the British Empire caused some discussion in Washington today. But there was no evidence that it would stir senators on the majority side to modify the reservation. The Democrats declared they would help their fight for a modification, however, while the irreconcilable opponents of ratification asserted that it would operate in the end to make acceptance of the treaty more doubtful.

Two modified drafts of the article 19 reservation to the peace treaty were laid before Republican senators today by Senator Hitchcock. Democratic opposition to the reservation was not expected. The Democrats would support whichever version the Republicans found preferable. It was indicated tonight, however, there was little hope of either being accepted, although a formal reply was withheld until tomorrow.

CHARGE OF FIRST DEGREE MURDER FOR CHATHAM RESIDENT
Mrs. Favre in New York Court.
IS HELD WITHOUT BAIL
Says She Was Daughter of Samuel J. Sutherland, Lumber Merchant in That City.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—Mrs. Emily Margaret Favre, formerly of Chatham, Ont., who shot and killed her 12-year-old daughter last week at their room in Washington, here, was held without bail for the grand jury today charged with murder in the first degree.
Her attorney's request that she be transferred to the toms in a taxicab was refused, and she had to make the trip in the jail van from the Harlem Prison, where many fashionably gowned women friends have been visiting her, bringing fruit and delicacies.
Mrs. Favre told police officials that she was born in Chatham, and that her father was Samuel J. Sutherland, who was in the lumber business in that city. Fourteen years ago, she was married at Chatham to Seymour Favre of New Orleans.
He took her to New Orleans, where, two years later, her baby was born, and about the same time she was divorced from Favre. Her father left her a good income when he died, and she had also received financial help from a brother. Unsuccessful investments caused the depletion of her income, and led her to kill the little girl, intending afterward to kill herself.

SOLDIER BURIED, BUT WIFE NOT NOTIFIED
HAMILTON, Feb. 13.—Judge Snider, who is investigating charges of mistreatment of returned soldiers in the Hospital for the Insane here, said today that evidence had been produced showing that there were only thirty nurses, though fifty were needed. Among the complaints heard was that of a soldier's widow, whose husband was buried from the institution without any notice of his death having been given to her.

LABOR IS THE SCARCEST COMMODITY ON THE MARKET

DETROIT, Feb. 13.—No man need be idle in Detroit if he is able to do a fair day's work, and he need not be experienced at that. Common labor is the scarcest commodity in the market, and six dollars a day is offered, with but few applicants. By actual count advertisements in daily newspapers today, 340 men are wanted in this city for manual labor, and there are but few to be had. Bank clerks, too, are in demand, one large financial institution is advertising for messengers, currency clerks and junior clerks, but it is in the automobile industry that the demand is greatest. Help of every kind, particularly experienced mechanics, is needed.

CANADA IS EXERCISING GREAT CARE TO KEEP OUT INFERIOR CLASS

Many Deportations Are Reported From Dominion Ports.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—Many immigrants are arriving daily in New York bound for Canada, and while it rests with the steamship companies to see that they get through to the border by rail, the United States authorities frequently find it necessary to make inspections and delay suspects at Ellis Island. The expense of this inspection and of escorting the Canada-bound immigrants to the border is borne by the steamship companies.
Canadian officials here today said that Canada is taking more precaution since the war than before in the matter of excluding all undesirable aliens. Agents have been sent to European ports to educate the people there upon the qualifications required to pass to the Dominion, the aim being to halt undesirable before they buy their tickets.
Attain Similar Results.
Acting Commissioner Uhl, in charge of Ellis Island station, said today that similar results are now being attained by the United States regulations since the war, which require that all immigrants shall procure passports from their home governments and that these shall be viced by the American consular at port of embarkation prior to sailing.

Scores Fail to Pass.
In spite, however, of every precaution on the other side of the water scores of immigrants arrive daily who fail to pass, and deportations have been numerous since the inflow of immigrants started up following the war. A great many deportations are due to failure to pass the literacy test. A dozen young women who came to New York to marry soldier sweethearts have failed in this test, and a bill now before Congress will correct that particular trouble.
There are many deportations from Canada through New York. A trainload of undesirable aliens was sent from Montreal, and Ellis Island officials were asked to see that these were placed on outgoing steamers safely.

RANEY FOR HIGHER SUCCESSION DUTIES TO PROVIDE FUNDS

Tells Mount Forest Audience New Revenue Needed.

MOUNT FOREST, Feb. 13.—Speaking before the board of trade here today in connection with the campaign in the East Wellington by-election, Hon. W. E. Raney, attorney-general, made it clear that in his opinion the only way in which Ontario could increase its revenue to keep pace with expenditures was by higher succession duty laws.
"This being the situation the province must do two things," declared the attorney-general. "It must economize and it must look for new sources of revenue. The latter, however, such as we may economize, the public service must be maintained and the money must be found."
Money, he said, must be found to provide for the \$500,000 deficit of the University of Toronto and the Government's good roads program.

BULLION SHIPMENTS HEAVY AT COBALT; ORE IS AGAIN LIGHT

COBALT, Feb. 13.—Ore shipments from the Cobalt camp were again light for the week ending tonight. Only three cars were sent out, the total shipments having aggregated about sixteen tons.

The shippers were McKinley-Darragh one car, \$3,460 pounds; Tensilekamin one car, \$2,720 pounds; Conings, one car, \$4,600 pounds.
Bullion shipments were heavy. Nipissing sent out 301,135 ounces in 225 bars, and Mining Corporation 109 bars containing 100,288 ounces. At the prevailing prices of silver, plus the exchange, the silver sent out aggregated in value approximately \$623,000, the richest week's shipments in the history of the camp.
