Sound-Thinking Politicians Concede Success To Bonar

LONDON, Nov. 3 .- (By Canadian Press) .- An anti-climax of the election has been forced on the eve of closing the nominations by the puzzle whether Mr. Lloyd George will yet produce his 150 emergency candidates for a direct fight at the polls for the control of the next parliament. With twelve hours remaining to announce the decision, his headquarters are mysteriously silent, only 170 of the 1,370 in the field being

Prime Minister Bonar Law's camp is jubilant, believing that Mr. Lloyd George cannot produce, and that Labor's crushing defeat in municipal voting clears the road for the Conservatives to go in with a working majority. The question in all Eng-land is: "Will the little Welshman at the last minute work his wizardry by changing the complexion of the whole campaign?"

The soundest opinion already concedes the success of Mr. Bonar Law. Labor's preliminary rout has shuffled the political deck in such a way that unless the Lloyd Georgians have a remarkably strong card up their sleeve, Mr. Bonar Law will be able to defy suggestions of a coalition.

J. H. Balderson, in the Outlook, has strikingly revised his last week's

figures in favor of the Conservatives, giving them 330 seats and reducing Labor to 115. The Indepedent Liberals got 105, and the Lloyd Georgian Liberals only 65. He says this majority of the Conservatives, though only 50, is absolute. Yet the figures of such a sound prognosticator may be upset by a sudden movement of consolidation in the Liberal ranks.

Bury the Hatchet.
The Manchester Liberals signficantly buried the hatchet today in deciding upon unity of action be-tween the Independents and the Coalitionists, and this may have widespread influence before the 15th. If their strength elsewhere can be solidified English politics may see a handshake between Mr. Lloyd George and Mr. Asquith, which would be almost miraculous after the long years of bitterness, and it would be a blow to the Conservatives.
