

BACON TYPE OF HOG WINS FAVOR

Yorkshires and Tamworths Predominate in Western Fair Swine Exhibits.

Fat-Producing Porkers Lose Popularity in Western Ontario.

Swine exhibited at the fair this year proved above everything else that the farmer of Western Ontario is going in strong for the bacon type of hog. This is borne out by the fact that Yorkshires and Tamworths, the ideal bacon hogs, predominated in the exhibits as a whole.

The growing popularity of the bacon type of hog was accredited by L. E. O'Neill of the department at Toronto, who acted as superintendent of livestock at the fair, to the demands of the British markets, which is at the present time the only outlet for Canadian pork. Mr. O'Neill stated that nothing but Wiltshire sides is suitable for export purpose.

Plan Grading System.
The government grading, which is to be effective in the near future, has much to do with the growing popularity of the Yorkshire-Tamworths. Every effort is being made by the government to foster the production of this type of hog to win back the British market from Denmark. The Berkshire, which at one time and still is in the United States more of a fat hog than a bacon type, is fast being turned into a bacon type in Canada through selected breeding. Gradually the farmers are getting rid of the heavy shoulders and producing in its place a long bodied hog.

Wins in Yorkshires.
In Yorkshires F. K. Featherston of Streetsville was a heavy winner, while J. E. Featherston of Hornsby and George Miner of Exeter captured many prizes.

George Douglas of Mitchell had no competition when he showed a drove of 40 Tamworth hogs. They were all splendid animals. Henry Capas, Wyoming; Dunn Bros., Essex, and George, Essex, were the winners in the Chester Whites, Duroc Jersey and Poland China classes, respectively. The exhibits were fewer than in 1921, but they were all of excellent quality.

INGERSOLL.—The death of Daniel Shepan occurred at his home, John street, in his 83rd year, following an illness of two years.

LONDON, ENG.—King George, in order to effect further economies in the royal household, is dispensing with a team of state carriage horses, reducing the staff and putting some of the servants on pensions.

JACKSON.—It is expected that the 47 miners entombed in the Argonaut mine will be reached by Sunday. Experts give out the cheering news that a supply of fresh air is entering the lower reaches of the mines.

raise in prices; next year will be worse, probably fatal, as far as we are concerned.

Mr. Rait, of the Thomas Furniture Company, was of the opinion that space charges in the buildings might be raised, and the gate admission lowered to the old scale.

He felt that the 25-cent admission during the whole week would result in a sufficiently large attendance to show the exhibitors a profit in sales. And the exhibitor, in turn, would gladly pay more for his space.

"I, for one," said Mr. Rait, "would far rather pay double for space, and have larger crowds."

The Family Man.
It is out of reason to expect a man with a family to come here with the 50 cent price prevailing, said W. B. Spaulding, of the Canadian Brush Company. "Many would come several times during the old system, but now they do not come at all. They won't pay 50 cents when Toronto charges 25 cents."

He pointed out that all his firm depends on at the Western Fair is sales of brushes, and during the last two years numbers of valuable customers have been lost.

A Swaze, representative in this district for the John Deere Company, pointed out that the advertiser that a farmer with a family of six might motor to Toronto almost at a saving. With the five for \$1 admission at Toronto, \$1.25 would admit six to the grounds and a similar amount to the grand stand. Here six admissions to the grounds and the grand stand totaled \$6.

"That is a saving," figured Mr. Swaze, "almost enough to pay for the trip. What farmer will pass that up? Why should the price be 50 cents here and five tickets for \$1 in Toronto?"

S. Orth, of Orth, Limited, who was talking with some other exhibitors when the advertiser saw him, was dissatisfied, as were the others. "It is to the detriment of the citizens, the Western Fair Board and the exhibitors," said Mr. Orth. "We expect to get circulation in Fair visitors in return for our trouble and expense. We certainly are not getting the crowds."

Comments heard everywhere on the grounds were very much in the same vein. One who would not have his name used compared Thursday night, with the lights out, to Appleton's day. Several were not certain that under existing circumstances they would exhibit next year.

"The directors must turn a pretty sharp corner," advised one manufacturer.

FORD WILL ERECT PLANT IN TORONTO

TORONTO, Sept. 15.—The Ford Motor Company has purchased fifty acres of land from the Grand Trunk Railway on the eastern border of the city for \$175,000, and will erect thereon a one-story car-assembling plant, having 150,000 feet of floor space.

This is the first property in Toronto or its vicinity sold by the Grand Trunk for more than 40 years. This particular property has been owned by the railway for 36 years.

PLANE CRASHES WHEN LANDING

Passengers Escape After Severe Shaking-Up in Merwin Heights Wreck.

Pilot Tries To Avoid Frightened Cattle and Strikes House.

The airplane which has been doing stunt flying at the Western Fair this week crashed in landing at Merwin Heights about 11:30 Friday morning. The plane was completely wrecked, except for the motor, which has been salvaged. The passengers escaped with a severe shaking up.

The plane, piloted by Capt. F. W. McCarthy, with J. Elliott as passenger, took flight at Hamilton and flew to London, where it did stunt flying over the fair grounds. It then proceeded to Merwin Heights, where it had been landing earlier in the week.

The ground at this place is rough and hilly, as it is nothing more than a pasture field. As Capt. McCarthy was about to land against the wind, as it serves as a brake, he was confronted by a herd of frightened cattle running wildly in front of him. He then attempted to land sideways, and as the view is obstructed at the pilot's seat, found that he was going down a steep grade straight for a farm house. He then tried to fly over the house, but hit and came crashing to the ground.

The plane was owned by J. Elliott of the J. Elliott Radio Manufacturing Company of Hamilton. Capt. McCarthy is also of Hamilton, and is known as one of Canada's best pilots.

The fliers had planned to leave London on Friday afternoon for New Hamburg, Kitchener, Elmira, Rockwood, Orangeville and Oakville, where they were to have done stunt flying.

REPORT DEREHAM MAN RECOVERING

James Nixon, Struck by Auto, Said To Be Progressing Favorably.

INGERSOLL, Sept. 15.—James Nixon of Dereham Township who was seriously injured on Thames street a few days ago by being run down by an automobile, is making favorable progress towards recovery at Alexander Hospital.

In addition to a very serious fracture of the right leg, Nixon suffered from a severe internal injury to the fact that he had only recently left a London hospital after undergoing a critical operation.

In the police court today Fred Cornish was charged with driving his automobile at an excessive rate of speed over Thames street intersection.

The speed at which he was traveling was estimated by Chief Holmes at about twenty miles an hour. Cornish pleaded guilty and was fined \$10 and costs.

FAILS TO ISOLATE POISON IN MYSTERIOUS CHEESE

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 15.—Canadian Press Cable.—Dr. Bruce Low, medical inspector for the ministry of health, who has been inquiring into the cases of cheese poisoning at Dover and Warrington, made a chemical test of the Dover cheese and failed to find any trace of poison and then made bacteriological and microscopic tests which also failed to detect any harmful bacillus.

Dr. Low then ate some of the cheese himself and immediately became ill. He carried out the same program with the cheese from Warrington with exactly similar results.

Steamship Noronic Ends Schedule Of Passenger Sailings For Season

SARNIA, Sept. 15.—The S. S. Noronic, flagship of the Northern Navigation Company's Steamers completed its summer schedule today on its arrival from Duluth and Port Arthur, and following the disembarkation of passengers at Detroit this evening, will return to Sarnia and move into winter dock.

The S. S. Noronic leaves for western lake ports Saturday afternoon on the schedule of the Noronic and the Thursday sailing is now discontinued. The passenger season on the lakes is now rapidly nearing a close.

While it has not been so large as last year, which constituted a record, traveling has been good. A record freight season, so far as the Northern Navigation vessels are concerned, is anticipated by the close of navigation.

Daughter Accuses Mother of Theft Of Gold Wrist Watch At Hamilton

HAMILTON, Sept. 15.—"In my 30 years' experience this is the most pathetic case I have met," commented Magistrate Jelfs today, when Catherine Arnold, now serving 21 days for drunkenness, was charged by her daughter, Frances Arnold, with the theft of a gold wrist watch. The daughter said her mother admitted taking the watch which had been presented to her by a young man. Mrs. Arnold said her husband and daughters were not satisfied with the 21-day sentence and wanted to have her put away for a longer time, because of her drinking habits.

EMPLOYMENT GAINS HALTED

British Labor Figures Show Little Progress Made in Month of August.

Number Still Workless in Great Britain Now Total 1,378,000.

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 15.—(Canadian Press Cable.)—It is officially announced that the unemployment figures for August are disappointing. The improvement which had been in progress since the beginning of the year was not maintained at the same rate as previously.

There was a marked improvement, however, in the coal mining industry, some improvement in the pig iron industry and also the iron and steel manufacture, but a moderate decline was noted in the cotton spinning, jute, pottery and glass trades.

The percentage of unemployment among members of the trade unions wherefrom returns have been received was 14.4 at the end of August, compared with 14.5 at the end of July and 14.3 at the end of August 1921. The registered unemployed at the end of August totalled approximately 1,378,000, including 1,121,000 men and 173,000 women compared with 1,400,000 at the end of July.

The fall of wages continued last month when the reduction aggregated about £450,000 in the weekly full-time wages of over 2,000,000 work people. There was an increase of £15,000 in the weekly wages of 90,000 persons.

During the month of August the cost of living fell two points to 79 per cent above the pre-war level.

APPRENTICES OF G. T. R. WIN PRIZES

Lead in All Mechanical Drawing Competitions At Toronto Exhibition.

MONTREAL, Sept. 15.—Advice has been received here from the management of the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto that the apprentices of the Grand Trunk Railway have been awarded first honors in all the mechanical drawing competitions at the exhibition. The entries in these competitions this year were more numerous than ever before.

The drawings submitted were grouped for judging into four classes—electrical, structural, steam and hydraulic, and in the opinion of the judges the work submitted was of the highest standard, indicating that Canada is producing many young engineers of outstanding ability. In addition to winning first prize in each class, the apprentices from various shops on the system were awarded two second prizes and a special prize—seven prizes out of a total of ten.

Sends Congratulations.
W. D. Robb, vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk, has sent a special message of congratulations to the apprentices and their chiefs, and is awarding additional prizes to the winners to mark the company's appreciation of their efforts and to encourage them to further progress. The new chief executive of the Grand Trunk has a deep interest in the welfare and advancement of the apprentices, having started his own railroad career as an apprentice in the Grand Trunk machine shops and risen step by step to his present position.

Twenty years ago Mr. Robb, as superintendent of motive power, obtained the support of the executive of the railway in remodelling the apprenticeship system, in which the Grand Trunk has been a pioneer on the North American continent. His plan has been continuously developed until the apprentice of today may obtain an education little short of a college course, and at the same time be independent and self-supporting.

There are now more than 800 apprentices in the motive power and car shops of the railway. They receive instructions from specially trained officers. There is a supervisory staff of apprentices, and at shops where 50 or more apprentices are employed there is a permanent class instructor, and at smaller shops, and at roundhouses the instruction is given weekly by a traveling instructor. In addition there is an apprentice examiner, who examines all the apprentices at periodical intervals. The boys are moved from one machine or class of work to another as their skill develops, and the instruction received in the shops is supplemented by classroom instruction in mechanics, mathematics, sketching and blueprint reading.

Evidence of the results obtained is found in the fact that the Grand Trunk has seldom been obliged to go outside of its own shops to fill the highest positions in its mechanical departments, while a large number of responsible positions in other railways are filled by men who obtained their early training in the Grand Trunk shops and apprenticeship classes.

INCREASES KEROSENE PRICE.

DETROIT, Sept. 15.—Henry Ford today took steps to close his Detroit automobile plants, beginning tonight, thereby throwing upwards of 100,000 workers in the Detroit district out of employment for an indefinite period.

He asked officials of the Detroit Street Railway to rearrange its schedules to care for the night forces at his various factories, who will be dismissed at 11 o'clock, it was announced.

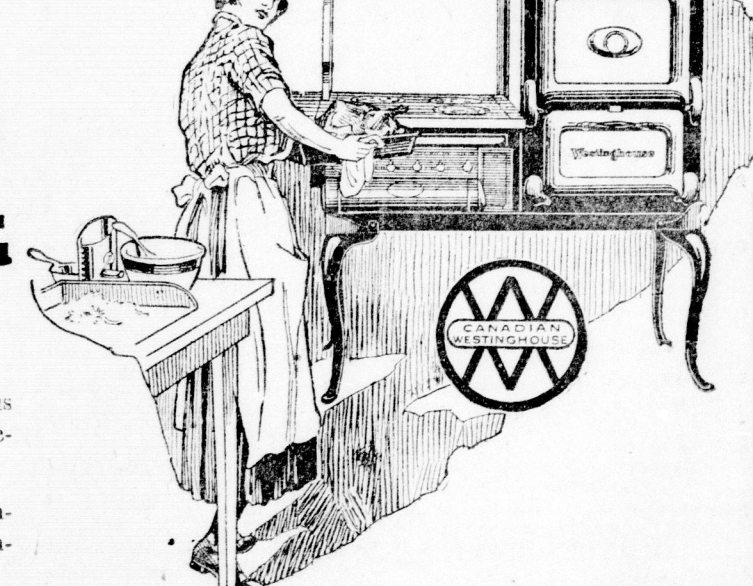
