Ernest Lapointe, the voice of Quebec, joined with Premier King minutes late this morning to preside in his appeal at Toronto last night for unity in Canada and the Empire. were accorded tremendous ovations and the meeting proved to be one of the greatest Liberal demonstrations ever held in Canada

SYSTEM OF RAIDING HOMES ROUSING IRE OF CITIZENS

Demand Reasonable Suspicion of Guilt Before Searches Are Made.

POLICE APOLOGIZE

The practice of police conducting liquor raids, acting upon information received from anonymous sources as brought protest from a numbe of Londoners, innocent of any O. T. A. v'olation, whose homes have been visited and searched by the officers. They claim that, being guiltless of any liquor violation, they are unduly embarrassed when their homes are raided, and that in many cases the raids were probably prompted by in formation given the police by personal grudge or spite and a wish to jeopardize their standing in the com-

munity. It is their contention that the police should exercise more discrimination in conducting raids and that a search warrant should not be sworn out until it is definitely es-tablished that liquor is kept for sale in a certain home. The question will probably be brought to the attention of the police commission upon the request of a prominent north Londor resident.

Informant Hidden.

The police admit that it is unfair to conduct a raid in search for lique at a residence where the owner is good standing and where information against him is only of a flimsy nature, having been given anony mously. They point out, however mously. They point out, however that many of their biggest convictions tions have been brought about from raids which had been prompted by complaints received at police station Inspector of Police Lucas this morning stated that the public was, course, their greatest source of information and that a hurried telephone message or an anonymous letter often put them on a fruitful

realizing that spite might have actuated some complaints, it is the habit of London police to conduct the raids as quietly as possible, with every officer wearing plain clothes, Inspector Lucas said. If WILL CONVENE MONDAY residents of a neighborhood suspected one man of bootlegging, his best vindication would be for the police to make an inspection of his home and a search for concealed liquor. If there was any suspicion against one individual at all, a police raid would be justified, he said, both to the satisfaction of the police themselves and in the interests of the suspect.

One Raid Fruitless.
