NO CANADA IF WE HAVE NOT UNITY

Mr. Little Represents Policy
For Nine Provinces—Mr.
Meighen Distrusted
in Seven.

Mr. E. S. Little has published a letter addressed to the people of London stating his reasons for being a candidate in the federal election. It is a good statement in many ways. It is clear, it is complete and it is fair. As an expression of national ideals and civic enterprise The Advertiser recommends Mr. Little's letter to its readers. It appears on page three of this edition.

But the really fine thing in Mr. Little's message is its patriotism. Mr. Little's appeal is based on the necessity of unity in Canada. His plea is that the needs of Canadians in the west must be reconciled with the wishes of Canadians in the east. He looks upon Canada as a consideration of nine different but equally important provinces. He believes that a division of east against west, of ill-will between farmer and manufacturer, of distrust between two races must be avoided above all else. He urges as the first need of Canada the unity and friendship of all provinces.

Mr. Little is entirely right. Without unity any policy on tariff, or railways, or trade, or immigration, is futile. It is because Mr. Little is right and because the only prospect of unity today lies in the broad and moderate course of the Prime Minister that The Advertiser is supporting Mr. Little in this election and urges its readers to vote for him.

ALTERNATIVE IS MEIGHEN.

The alternative is Right Hon. Mr. Meighen. Mr. Meighen's appeal is based entirely on the statement that Canada faces ruin; his one and only policy is to make the tariff higher and higher.

Let us see what would happen if Mr. Meighen had his way.

Mr. Meighen's policy does not touch the needs of the maritime provinces. The leading Conservative paper of Nova Scotia (the Halifax Herald) in a list of six "Maritime Rights" makes only a passing reference to the tariff and it is an endorsement of Premier King's non-political tariff board.

Mr. Meighen's leadership can not hold the goodwill of Quebec. Mr. Meighen is not trusted by the people of Quebec. He is in fact so distrustful that he has not entered the province in this campaign. He has handed over his work to Mr. Patenaude, whose hope of success has been based on his repudiation of Mr. Meighen's leadership.

Mr. Meighen's policy is a fear to Canadians in the west. Canadians in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta—three great provinces of Canada—believe that any higher tariff will completely block their progress. They fear that policy so truly that secession of the west from confederation becomes a possibility if it is enforced.

In seven of Canada's provinces—the maritimes, Quebec, the prairies—Mr. Meighen can not hope to bring either confidence or goodwill. He would bring, in fact, the opposite of unity, and all the grave consequences of internal dissension.

KING REPRESENTS UNITY.

The Prime Minister represents unity—a moderate policy with regard to the needs and wishes of all provinces. Canada today is doing well; she is winning; all she needs is united energy to clinch the prosperity that is knocking at her door.

London should vote for E. S. Little and put herself on the side of unity for all Canada.

TWO CARTER AWARDS WON BY CITY PUPILS

Two London high school students tie among the three Middlesex winners of the twelfth award of scholarships provided for by the will of the late J. I. Carter of Sarnia, according to an announcement from the Minister of Education.

Miss Louise Wyatt of central stands first in the county list, with Arthur C. Hill of the south collegiate, in second place. Third prize is awarded to Neil D. Runnalls of Strathroy.

The scholarships are awarded annually to the three candidates who obtain the highest marks on not more than ten papers of the June upper school examinations in each of four counties. The awards are \$100, \$60 and \$40, respectively.

THREE INJURED AS CAR DITCHED

Serious Accident Occurs On the
Ingersoll Highway Near
Beachville.

Beachville, Oct. 24.—Three Brownsville residents were severely injured at 11 o'clock last night, when the large sedan in which they were riding ditched in this village in front of the home of John James. The cause of the accident is unknown.

The injured are Norman Corbett, the driver, who was badly cut about the head and face, Mrs. Norman Corbett, who suffered a fractured hip, a broken arm, and bruises, and Miss Olive Minshall, who incurred a broken leg.

At the Ingersoll hospital this morning the three victims were reported to be resting easily. Their conditions are not considered serious.

The party was driving west on the Ingersoll highway when the accident occurred. First aid was rendered by Miss Mildred Ward, a trained nurse, of London, who was visiting at a home near the scene of the mishap, after which the victims were removed to Ingersoll, where their injuries were attended by Dr. J. M. Rogers.

The sedan did not turn over when it struck the ditch, but it was badly damaged. It was later towed to Ingersoll for repairs.

Driverless Truck Speeds For Two Blocks On Elmwood; Swerves To Avoid Traffic

Woman Driver Jams Brakes
Just in Time to Prevent
Crash With Runaway.

PEDESTRIANS SCURRY

Mystery in Strange Occurrence
Which Was Without Serious
Result to Traffic.

A runaway truck, swerving driverless for two blocks along Elmwood avenue near Wharncliffe road yesterday, caused panic among motorists along the street and barely escaped crashing into an oncoming motor car driven by a woman.

The truck, a delivery vehicle, was left standing on an incline with the engine running. It is not known how the gears permitted it to drive away without the assistance of the driver, but it sped along the street in an almost direct path for two blocks, the left side of the road and drove straight at an approaching motorist. The woman driver, helpless in the situation, jammed her brakes. The runaway truck, striking a slight incline, swerved again and, mounting the curb, came to a standstill as it struck a tree, missing the motor car and a collision by inches.

It is criminal negligence to leave a car on an incline or without the brakes on where it is liable to run away. Chief of Police Robert Birrell said today. Had an accident occurred, the driver, although not entirely responsible, Police intend to lay information against the man should he be identified as unable to tell who the car belonged to.

Kaiser's Statue Communist Mark

Plan To Dynamite Likeness of
Emperor William Is
Discovered.

Berlin, Oct. 24.—Plans to dynamite a statue of Emperor William I. in the main street of Breslau were discovered Thursday night.

Pedestrians all day long observed two men in workmen's clothes chisel into the marble structure. A note to Athens regarding the matter was sent, but no success was achieved until after the afternoon.

Police inquiries revealed that they were Communists, who had planned to insert dynamite in the hole and blow up the monument.

HUGH GUTHRIE CONDEMNNS EGG-GRADING REGULATIONS

Guelph, Ont., Oct. 24.—"If the Conservatives are elected Motherwell's egg-grading system goes by the boards," Hon. Hugh Guthrie told a Conservative mass meeting here tonight. The existing egg-grading regulations, he said, were "irksome and unjust."

Guthrie's wife and small daughter could be seen on market days lined up waiting their turn to submit their eggs to inspectors who would know a good egg from a bad one. Some eggs had been given three different gradings in one hour, he said. Farmers should not be hampered in their business by such grading regulations as now existed.

175,519 CROWS' EGGS GATHERED IN MANITOBA

Winnipeg, Oct. 24.—More than a quarter of a million crows' eggs, crows' feet and gophers' tails were gathered in the crowd and gopher extermination competition carried on this season by the Manitoba department of agriculture. The exact numbers are: Crows' eggs, 175,519; crows' feet, 23,443; gophers' tails, 17,153. The province has distributed \$2,150 in prize money.

GROGER SUFFOCATED AFTER BEING GAGGED

New York, Oct. 24.—A mystery crime featured today's record of criminal activities in New York.

The body of an unidentified man, securely tied and gagged, was found lying across an empty packing-case in the rear of a grocery store in East 12th street. The room had been used for storage of supplies, the building being a crowded five-story tenement.

The dead man later was identified as William Zimmerman, a 35-year-old man. The medical examiner found that he had been suffocated by a cloth gag tied across his face. Coins were scattered about the floor near his body, indicating that he had been robbed.

Berlin Births Show Increase

Berlin, Oct. 24.—Statistics compiled by the Prussian statistical bureau show that Berlin today is the healthiest city in Prussia. The city also records a greater number of marriages, a smaller death-rate and a higher birth-rate than any other community or communities aggregating equal population.

During the first half of the present year, 7.6 marriages took place for every 1,000 inhabitants as compared with 7.4 during the same period in 1924. The birth-rate also steadily increased during the first six months of this year to the extent of 20.65 births per 1,000 as compared with 19.58 the first half of 1924.

GREEK OFFENSIVE HAS BEEN RENEWED

Bulgarian Territory Penetrated
For Seven Miles On a
20-Mile Front.

Sofia, Oct. 24.—Large contingents of Greek troops continue to be sent toward the Bulgarian border, the Bulgarian Telegraph Agency announces. It considers this an indication that the Greeks intend to enlarge the scope of their present offensive.

TWO ARRESTED AFTER ACCIDENT

F. Kingham in Hospital and
L. Cake and E. Blackwell
in Court.

Following a motor accident early this morning in which Frederick Kingham, 266 Grosvenor street, was run down and seriously injured, Louis Cake, 47, and Ernest Blackwell, 29, faces charges under the highway traffic act and criminal code.

Both men appeared in court this morning. The condition of Kingham, in a certain home, was reported as being about the same. He is expected to remain in hospital for at least six months, suffering from fractured hips, a strained back and other injuries, necessitating the removal of the motor car.

While application will be made for bail, although no amount was set by Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon today, Cake is charged with permitting his car to be recklessly driven, and Blackwell, the driver, is charged with causing bodily harm when he struck Kingham.

The men were arrested by Motor-cycle Officer Charles Nollie a few hours after they had left the scene of the accident without giving their name and address and offering assistance.

TWO LIBERAL NOMINEES WITHDRAW IN LOTBIERE

Quebec, Oct. 23.—The first withdrawals after yesterday's nominations came from Lotbiniere, where two of the three Liberals named have dropped out of the fight, word to that effect reaching Liberal headquarters here tonight.

The men who withdrew are Notary Verville and Omer Langlois. The field in that division is now clear for Ulicker Paris.

SENATE VICE-PRESIDENT FINED IN POLICE COURT

Paris, Oct. 24.—Antony Ratier, vice-president of the senate and former minister of justice, was fined 300 francs in police court yesterday for his refusal to testify under oath before a parliamentary commission charged with investigating the origin of funds used by various political parties in the electoral campaign of May, 1924.

Mrs. George Fiske of Montreal, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Back of this city, is the "Dorothy," who is heiress to a \$5,000 estate which her uncle, Alister Anderson of Tooele, Utah, willed her, and for whom police of this city were asked to conduct a search.

Photographs of Mrs. Fiske, who was married in London only two months ago, were sent to Chief Birrell from Utah. In a letter which came from an executor of the estate it was learned that unless the girl could be located the money would be turned over to the state.

CELLAR BATTLE FATAL TO THREE

New York, Oct. 24.—Three men were killed in what police believe was a battle between 15 bootleggers in the basement of a rooming-house early today.

Two men were found dead in the hall and the third died late in a hospital from a bullet in his brain.

John Magliorretti, said to be part owner of the house, was arrested charged with suspicion of homicide. The men found dead were identified as Michael Orza, of Yonkers, N. Y., and Vincenzo Schlammeo, of Manhattan. The third man was known to the police only as "Willie."

MURPHY PREDICTS LIBERAL GAINS

Return to Power of Premier
King Now Regarded as
Inevitable.

"I never count seats before the election, but I will say that I am sure that Premier King will have more supporters in the next parliament than he had in the last," declared Senator Charles Murphy, postmaster-general in the Liberal government, when seen by The Advertiser at the C. N. R. this morning. Secretary Murphy is on his way to assist the Hon. George Graham in his campaign in South Essex.

From observations he had made during the past few months in different parts of the dominion, he was convinced that the return to power of the King administration was inevitable.

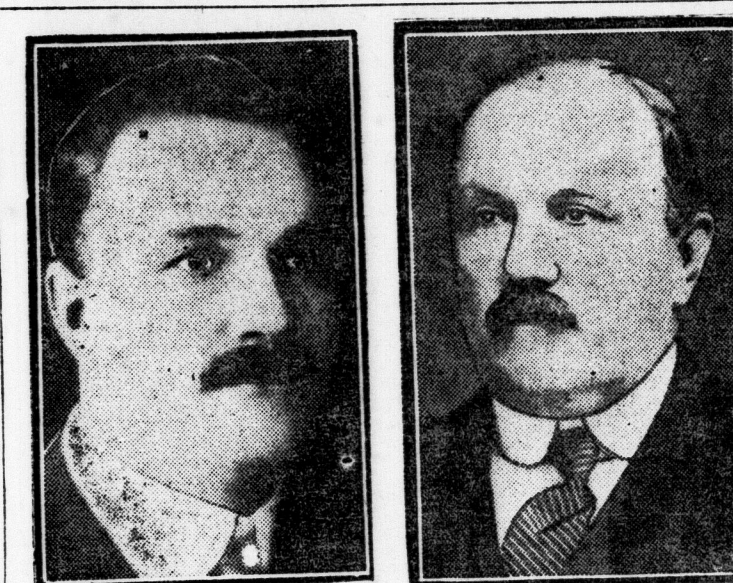

PREMIER KING AT TORONTO MEETING.

All three were accorded tremendous ovations and the meeting proved to be one of the greatest Liberal demonstrations ever held in Canada.

SYSTEM OF RAIDING HOMES ROUSING IRE OF CITIZENS

Demand Reasonable Suspicion
of Guilt Before Searches
Are Made.

POLICE APOLOGIZE

The practice of police conducting liquor raids, acting upon information received from anonymous sources, has brought protest from a number of Londoners, innocent of any O. T. A. violation, whose homes have been visited and searched by the officers. They claim that, being guiltless of any liquor violation, they are unduly embarrassed when their homes are raided, and that in many cases the raids were probably prompted by information given the police by personal grudge or spite and a wish to jeopardize their standing in the community.

It is their contention that the police should exercise more discretion in conducting raids and that a search warrant should not be sworn out until it is definitely established that liquor is kept for sale in a certain home. The question will probably be brought to the attention of the police commission upon the request of a prominent north London resident.

MISTAKE MADE BY FOREMAN

Archibald Todd Appears in
Ingersoll Court on Charge
of Perjury.

EVIDENCE OF REGISTRAR

Defence of Liberal Worker Is
Wrong Information Given
Regarding Linemen.

Ingersoll, Oct. 24.—Standing-room was at a premium when Magistrate John L. Paterson entered court 59 minutes late this morning to preside over the case against Archibald F. Todd, farmer, Beachville, charged with perjury in swearing to the eligibility of seven French-Canadian linemen, members of a C. N. R. gang, as voters at polling subdivision No. 5, North Oxford township, in the South Oxford riding.

Donald Sutherland, Conservative candidate in next week's election, laid the charge against Todd, who is a worker supporting James W. Innes, Liberal candidate, and thus feeling is running high. The defendant was in the courtroom with his lawyer, S. G. McKay, K.C., Woodstock, 15 minutes before the court was scheduled to open at 10 a.m. while Crown Attorney R. N. Ball, K.C., Woodstock, and Mr. Sutherland did not appear until quite late, presumably having been in consultation with the magistrate.

The names of the men alleged to have been placed on the list illegally are J. B. Cheverier (foreman), Ovide Denis, Homides Menard, Euclide Lenoir, Welly Leduc, G. Levas and Aldric Masse.

Mr. Innes C. H. Denton, Tillsonburg, returning officer for South Oxford; Dr. H. G. Furlong, president of Ingersoll Liberal association; William H. Chambers, Conservative M. L. A., South Oxford, and Mr. Brown, Tillsonburg, vice-president, South Oxford Liberal association, were prominent among those present. The persistent murmur ceased abruptly as Magistrate Paterson entered the room, and as Todd pleaded not guilty and elected for summary trial.

REGISTRAR GIVES EVIDENCE.

Fred Garner, registrar of the polling subdivision, was the first witness called. He testified that Todd had come to him on Oct. 20 to put some names on the list, which he did upon Todd's "making certain representations." Todd apparently did not take the full prescribed oath, but merely read over "the required qualifications."

The Advertiser is informed that Mr. Todd's defence is that the foreman of the gang made a mistake in informing him that the men came to the riding in July, when in fact it was the following month. Mr. Todd claims that he then immediately rang up Mr. Sutherland to inform him of the mistake and that thus there was no intentional effort upon his part to have any names placed upon the list which should not properly have been placed there.

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
