Special Cable Letter to the Free Press. London, Feb. 29 .- The question is now being asked whether the demonstration on the landing here of Dr. Jameson and his fellow-raiders was a genuine outburst of public feeling, or whether it was not largely due to plans made by the Government to excite the country against the Transvaal. It would be, of course, difficult to bring any proof against the Government in the matter of authorizing the use of provocative agents. Some of the members of the present Minreturn of the filibusters in mystery, See our Japanese Silk and having them tracked by press representatives from point to point, the Government could, if it had so desired, have let the affair fizzle out quietly, and could have avoided all fuss in taking the prisoners to the Bow street police court. The Conservative papers pretend that the demonstration attending the arrival of the party will embarrass the Government, tending to adversely affect the negotiations with the Transvaal. A more correct point of view is that the demonstrations were designed to support the Government in its impending attack on the Transvaal. The Speaker says it is impossible to acquit the authorities of responsibility for the Jameson demonstration. The Govern-

ment, it adds, has done its best to give prominence to jingoism and to convert the incidents to party purposes, to the detriment of justice and the national repute. London syndicates and other forces are now trying to mislead the opinion of the British and drag them into the commission of a crime worse than the partition of the Transvaal. These forces have secured the command of too many papers, and have the help of too many

ON THE VENEZUELAN FRONTIER Kingston, Ja., Feb. 29.-Latest advices from British Guiana say that large reinforcements of police continue to be pushed forward to stations on the Venezuelan frontier. Although, strictly speaking, not a "soldier" has been sent forward, a British force of considerable strength. well drilled and capably officered, has been gathered at strategic points along the alleged boundary, and the stations have been connected by telegraph. Uruayan is garrisoned by nearly 100 policemen, armed with Maxim guns, which have not yet been withdrawn, despite the promise that they should be.

C., Feb. 29.-An effort will be made to-day to prevent the dedication of the statue of Father Pere Marquette, in statuary hall of the capitol, by Mr. Linton, the member from Michigan, who is an avowed representative of the A. P. A. doctrines. Mr. Linton has prepared a resolution to prevent the placing of the statue in the capitol, basing his protest on a law providing that only statues of citizens of the state furnishing them shall be placed there, and claiming that Father Marquette was not a citizen of Wisconsin.



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
