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He Denies The Charge

Dry Kilt at Welch's Destroyed With Its Contents—Boys Whipped.

From Our Own Correspondent. A new Westminster, May 5.—The dry kilt of Welch's single mill in the west end of this city was destroyed by fire this morning together with two carloads of finished product being dried and a considerable quantity ready for shipment.

The fire originated in spontaneous combustion and had got quite a start before being noticed. Fortunately, the little wind which was blowing at the time was directed the flames away from the mill, which was saved by the timely arrival of the firemen and by the powerful fire pumps on the ferry steamer.

The whole property is covered by insurance in several companies, but the owner's loss is small compared with his expense in Vancouver earlier this year. The fire caused the loss of the dry kilt and the contents of the mill.

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Prisoners Shot
