Not only is he gambling, but he is gambling against very heavy odds. He is subject to the unscrupulous and dishonest manipulation of stocks by powerful cliques. Such cliques now circulate false stories designed to cause a bidding up by the public of securities the manipulators have to sell: they now issue injurious statements to induce a general selling of securities they want to buy.
