### TARIFF REVOLT IN MASSACHUSETTS

Republicans Lose a Strong-  
hold—Majority of 14,500  
Turned to Big Minority

### FAVORS CANADA

BROCKTON, Mass., Mar. 22.—  
The national political weather-  
cock turned Democratward in  
Massachusetts today, when the  
Old Colony section, one of the  
Republican strongholds of the  
state, placed Eugene N. Foss of  
Boston, one of the country's  
leading exponents of reciprocity  
with Canada, in the congressional  
seat of the late Wm. C. Lov-  
ering of Taunton.

Mr. Foss accomplished what  
was regarded almost a political  
miracle, turning a Republican  
plurality of 14,500 into a Demo-  
cratic victory of 5,540.

### MADE GOOD RUN DESPITE ACCIDENT

The English mail special which  
passed through Moncton at eleven  
o'clock Thursday night, made the run  
from Halifax to Montreal in a little  
less than twenty-seven hours. The  
train left Halifax at ten minutes to  
five Thursday afternoon and arrived  
in Montreal at half past nine that  
night. A delay of four hours and a  
half was caused at Russell's Sliding  
near Newcastle early Friday morn-  
ing, owing to the tire on one of the  
driving wheels on the engine breaking.  
The accident disabled the locomotive  
so that it could not proceed further  
and another one was sent out from  
Newcastle to take the train to Camp-  
bellton.

### IMPORTANT CHANGE IN SIGNALS ON I. C. R.

A few days ago an order was issued  
on the I. C. R. changing the system  
of signals on the trains to bring it  
into uniformity with the system used  
on all other big railways in Canada.  
All express trains will in future dis-  
play two red flags on the rear car  
and two in front of the engine with  
the same number of red lights at  
night. Ordinary trains instead of red  
flags and lights will display green flags  
and lights in the same manner.

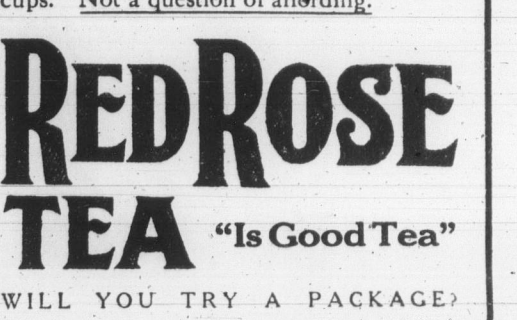

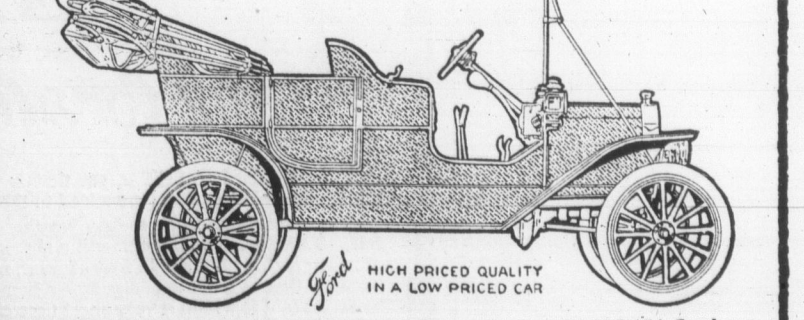
