## TOO FAR

The proper sphere of a small country newspaper is to give its readers full reports of all local happenings, leaving the matter of politics as a political game to the proper channels, those being the highly paid city dailies. Yet there may be some political happening which calls forth the indignation of the local people irrespective of their political leanings, and such has happened to the eternal disgrace of the conservative party. A vacancy occurred in the train despatchers office for a stenographer. A young lady who was in employment applied and was found by the officials to be entirely capable of taking the position. She was engaged on the recommendation of Mr. D. A. Stewart one of the patronage committee and her former employers were begged to allow her to start her duties at once. To help out by all in their power, and to allow the young lady to take full advantage of a better position they allowed her to enter the service of the I.C.R. on a moment's notice.

The lady in question held the position for one month and then at the request of the conservative office-seekers was dismissed. Why, because she was the sister of a noted liberal politician Mr. A. E. G. McKenzie. It was not because she could not do the work, for she was retained to show her successor what to do, although she herself had to find things out for herself, it wasn't because she had a vote, and it wasn't for lack of appreciation among the officials and clerks of the I.C.R. No, it was because of this damned patronage system which is the root of all evil in our political life, and if not checked will ruin the honor of anyone who enters the political arena, and turn into a gang of grafters, those men who as members of legislature should be as Caesar's wife, above reproach.

A grave error by the party has been made in allowing this disgrace to be perpetrated, an error which will yet come back to them in ways that they wot not of. We quote the words of a leading conservative of this town, when asked his opinion on the matter. Here's what he said, "Things have come to a pretty pass when the political game is so debauched as to destroy the chance of a young girl earning her own living. If it had enough getting after men who as often as not have shown they took no part in political work, but when they start the persecution of a family and desecrate the maidenly feelings of a young girl making her a political football, it is an inhuman disgrace. I am ashamed to say I am a conservative." Are there any others feeling the same way?

## EDITOR GRAPHIC,

Dear Sir:

In reply to your Query "Is there any license required before one can open a beer shop" see chapter XLV. section 22 consolidated statutes 1903, an act passed 13th April, 1911. Section one states relating to beer licenses, being sections 119 to 123 inclusive, of said act together with all amendments, shall apply to the town of Grand Falls and the town of Campbellton.

Section 120 states "A Beer License shall be construed to mean a license to sell temperance drinks such as ginger beer, spruce beer, hop beer, root beer, soda water, syrups and similar liquids as beverages, simple or mixed, not being spirituous, malt or intoxicating liquors in quantities less than one quart."

Section 121 states should any person not having a beer license sell in quantities less than one quart or keep for sale for the purpose of being sold in quantities less than one quart any of the drinks for which license is required by this chapter, he shall be liable to the same penalties as a person selling intoxicating liquor by retail without being duly licensed therefor which would be covered by section 62, first offence \$50 and costs, second offence four months, third offence six months. If any one will read the Liquor License Act and amendments they will readily understand that the liquor law is being broken every day in Campbellton. But why should the beer sellers be troubled when liquors of all kinds are being sold in many places in our own town, we believe, to many of the officials whose duty it is to see that the liquor license law is carried out.

We wish to thank you, Mr. Editor, for asking for information in reference to this matter, and that you will secure a copy of the act and print them in order that parties interested may know where we stand.
