ELECTION CARD

To the Electors of the Town of Campbellton, Ladies and Gentlemen:
We are appealing to you again for your support in the coming Civic Election to be held on the twenty-second day of January, A. D. 1924.

Our record for the past three years we can truly look upon with pride. Upon taking office three years ago, we found our sewerage system on Main, Minto and Roseberry Streets, altogether inadequate. The ratepayers, reading on these streets threatened the Town with serious law suits. We at once took steps to have this situation remedied, by providing a complete sewerage system.

As you are aware the sixteen inch water main, situated at the corner of Duncan's Hill or Sagard Lane Street, this system has been extended. The Insurance Companies have been continually raising their rates and some peoples insurance on that account has been threatened with cancellation. This part of the water system has been economically extended.

The next serious question that confronted the Council was the water shortage; His Worship, Mr. C. McKay while in office strongly advocated at a banquet in the Town of Campbellton that the solution of our water shortage was the bringing in of a supply from Christopher Brook, eight miles from our Town; the source of that supply as designated by him, was at a point where the old I. N. R. crossed the Christopher Brook, which was a charge and held for the arrival of the Police officer from Bathurst.

No other arrests were on the book for the week. Several cases were occupied the attention of the court.
