THE CITIZENS RECOMMEND THE ACCEPTANCE OF THE GOVERNMENT PROPOSAL.
Professional versus Lay Opinion—Aid.

A mass meeting of the ratepayers was held in St. Lawrence hall last night to consider the harbor question. Owing to neglect in advertising properly the meeting was attended by about one hundred citizens only, but everyone was a representative man. The professional opinions expressed were all in support of closing the eastern gap, as recommended by Captain Eads; but the lay opinion was to keep it open, a resolution was carried calling on the council to accept the offer of the government to make the improvements, if the city paid one-third of the cost.

The mayor called the meeting to order and narrated the interview that he and other representatives of the city had had with Sir Hector Longvin. The minister had told them that the government would pay two-thirds of the cost if the city paid the other. The meeting to-night was to say whether the citizens would recommend the council to assume this one-third of the cost or not.

Ald. Roswell said that he had presented reports on Ottawa sufficient to convince the government that the harbor was not navigable.
