INSPECTOR WHITE TO LEAVE FOR OTTAWA IN A DAY OR TWO.
Hon. G. W. Ross says he has decided to accede to the request of the French Committee of the Ottawa Separate Schools to reorganize the schools with Lay Teachers.

Mr. Ross said that he had received the letter referred to and intended to accede to the request. He was greatly pleased with the outcome of the investigation and, in fact had never had such a quick remedying of faulty schools before.

It is stated that while Mr. Ross was in England recently, he was approached by some of the steamship companies with a view to their submitting an offer for a 17-knot service, which a decision is reached by the Imperial Government in reference to Mr. Huddart's scheme.
