THE LATE JOHN FISHER

The funeral of the late John Fisher, who died at the home of his son-in-law, Geo. Brodie, Blind line, on Oct. 11th, took place last Thursday. Interment in Beechwood cemetery. Rev. H. D. Cameron conducted the services. The bearers were: W. W. Anderson, D. D. Brodie, John Kernohan, Robert McLaren, Donald McLachlan and D. Whyte. Mr. Fisher was born in Harper, Lanark County, in November, 1844, and therefore was 77 years of age. He was married to Elizabeth Steele and came to Warwick with his family nearly 35 years ago, settling on the 5th con., on the farm now owned by John Kernohan. There they continued to reside until the death of Mrs. Fisher nine years ago last April. He is survived by three sons and one daughter: Frank Fisher of Fleming, Sask.; John Fisher of Vancouver; Arch. Fisher of Lethbridge, Alta.; and Mrs. George Brodie, with whom he had made his home since the death of his other daughter, the late Mrs. D. P. Brodie, who died a few years ago. One little son died when very young. Archie Fisher of Sarnia, and Donald Fisher of Walkerville, are brothers of the deceased, and Mrs. A. F. Steele of Forest, is his sister. Two other sisters, Mrs. Campbell of Ottawa; and Mrs. Anderson, of Perth, also survive. Mr. Fisher was an Elder of the Forest Presbyterian church for many years, and faithfully attended the services, while health permitted.

WYOMING BANDITS CAR FOUND

The R. T. Wright auto, stolen from Thorndale last Tuesday night, and suspected as being the machine in which the Wyoming bank robbers were travelling when they robbed the bank on Thursday last, has been found submerged in the Chippawa canal. This would indicate that the robbers, if they were driving this car headed for the Niagara frontier, and have safely crossed it by now.

Mr. Wright was notified from Chippawa Tuesday morning of the recovery of his car. A phone message from the Davidson & Williams Garage, Chippawa, informed him that the car has been discovered lying in the canal, completely covered by water. It was hauled out and found to be a complete wreck.

Before running the car into the river the bandits had changed the license plates, substituting plates stolen from a car of the Heintzman Piano Company in St. Catharines. The theory of Messrs. Davidson & Williams is that the thieves got across the Niagara River in a boat which met them by previous arrangement. The automobile was sent into the river with the throttle of her engine wide open and the ignition switch on. All the doors were wide open, indicating that the robbers had jumped out of the car after heading it for the river.

The clock was stopped at 2 o'clock probably 2 in the morning, after the robbery, as the St. Catharines license plates were stolen on Thursday night, the night of the robbery.

In the car a brown cap and a mackinaw coat, with a belt at the back, were found.
