HOLSTEIN CATTLE RESEARCH—USE OF SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH
TAX CREDIT

Mr. William C. Winegard (Guelph): Mr. Speaker, I rise today to urge Dreamstreet Holsteins to negotiate with Holstein Canada, the University of Guelph and others to develop a new and sound research proposal in order that the majority of the funds provided under the scientific research tax credit scheme can be used for research of benefit to Canada.

The current proposal does not have the support of the agricultural community and will not have that support until Dreamstreet decides to turn the project into a major comprehensive research effort. In the meantime Revenue Canada should use every means at its disposal to ensure that only research approved by the scientific community is undertaken with taxpayers' dollars.

# **GOVERNMENT EXPENDITURES**

MARLIN TRAVEL CONTRACT AWARD

Mr. Stan J. Hovdebo (Prince Albert): Mr. Speaker, the awarding of a \$130 million contract to Marlin Travel Ltd. for government travel will save very little money in the long run. The main effect of the move will be the loss of 90 jobs in Air Canada and CP Air. Some people may be hired by Marlin Travel but most will be out looking for jobs. Those who do find jobs with Marlin Travel will do so at much lower salaries and much reduced benefits, such as medical, dental and pension plans.

Can this kind of reduction in work conditions be considered a saving, Mr. Speaker?

INTEREST RATE LEVELS

Mr. Jack Scowen (Mackenzie): Mr. Speaker, Bank of Canada interest rates have dropped 3.75 percentage points since the Government took office in September, 1984. The Bank of Canada rate now stands at 8.72 per cent while most banks are charging 10.75 per cent to preferred borrowers. There is a 4.5 point spread between top savings accounts and the cost to preferred corporate customers. The spread is much greater for operating and consumer loans.

One of the high costs to our agriculture communities is interest rates. For the good of the country we must get agriculture loans to below 6 per cent.

ISSUANCE OF MINISTERIAL PERMITS
