insured loan of \$600,000 provided by CMHC required to construct this complex.

This initiative is another strong indication of our government's commitment to assist the elderly in our society in maintaining a decent standard of living. I commend the Minister of State for Housing for his support in making this project a reality.

#### LITERACY VOLUNTEER AWARDS

# THE ECONOMY
