journment. He then puts the question thus:—

"It is moved by the Honourable....., That "seconded by the Honourable....., That "the Senate do now adjourn. Those who are "in favour of the motion will say 'Content,' "those who are against it will say 'Not Content.' (A pause.) Carried, or the 'Contents' have it. Pursuant to the Order of your Honourable House, I declare the Senate "continued until, at three o'clock in the afternoon, the Senate so decreeing."

Petitions, &c. presented. 28. Should any Senator offer to present any petitions or returns, before the adjournment, they ought not to be refused. Though it is more respectful to transact no business before the Address is adopted. M. 229, 614, 616.

Speaker withdraws.

29. The Speaker then retires, bowing, as usual, to the Senators and to the Throne.

Subsequent Sessions. 30. At the opening of a second or subsequent Session the proceedings are the same as at the first Session, omitting such parts of them as do not apply. B. 99.
