

allies or other public places of diversion, and permitting persons to play thereto, on Sundays, shall pay a fine of forty shillings.

ART. 20—No person shall, on Sundays, sell or expose for sale any sort of provision, goods or fruit in the markets or in the streets, or in any public part of the city or suburbs, under the penalty of five shillings.

ART. 21—Experience having proved that the water falling from the projecting spouts is extremely prejudicial to the pavement of the streets, as well as inconvenient to passengers, it is ordered that the water shall be conveyed from the roof of every house or building adjoining any square, street or lane, within the city, or in any of the streets in the suburbs which have been levelled, in close spouts or gutters, descending to within a foot of the ground, and close to the house or building, under the penalty of forty shillings, and five shillings a week, after conviction, until this regulation be complied with. And it shall be the duty of occupiers of houses and buildings to have the said spouts or gutters constructed as hereby required, deducting the expence thereof from the rent if they are tenants.

ART. 22—Any person who shall carry off, remove, destroy or wilfully injure any gutter or spout, or any step or steps or other appendage to an house or building by law permitted to be outwardly used, shall incur and pay a penalty of twenty shillings, and if the offender be an apprentice or a minor, then the penalty shall attach upon the master or parent.

ART. 23—All occupiers of houses or lots, situate in squares, streets or lanes of the city or suburbs, which are paved, or where gutters are made, shall, from and after the first day of May until the fifteenth
